Chairman Hasbrouck presented the commissioners' agenda for September 13, 2021. Commissioner Bingaman made a motion to approve the commissioners' agenda for September 13, 2021. Commissioner Maupin seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to approve the commissioners' agenda for September 13, 2021.

Senior Deputy Auditor, Kalyn Mauk presented the commissioners with Fiscal Year 2021 claims, board order claims and junior college applications.

Commissioner Maupin made a motion to approve the claims and board order claims as presented. Commissioner Bingaman seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to approve the claims and board order claims as presented.

Assessor, June Fullmer informed the commissioners that Chief Deputy Assessor, Sue Leeper had been working from home. She advised that Kathy Riffie with Department of Motor Vehicles would be moving to the Assessor's Office in October of 2021. She explained that the Department of Motor Vehicles Office in McCall have been allowing walk ins. She presented that the appraisers had been conducting field work for the past few weeks. She provided a brief overview of the new assessments that were being done on new homes that are being built. Chairman Hasbrouck asked about the office hours of the Department of Motor Vehicles in Cascade. June explained the reason for the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The commissioners requested June analyze the possibility of restructuring the hours of operation.

Clerk, Douglas Miller provided an overview of matters involving the Clerk's Office. He informed the commissioners that the Clerk's Office was preparing L2 worksheets to submit to the Idaho State Tax Commission for certification of levies for tax year 2021.

Chief Deputy Prosecuting Attorney, Brian Oakey presented on behalf of the Prosecuting Attorney's Office. He advised that the Prosecuting Attorney's Office had been busy with criminal and civil matters. He presented on open meeting law violations that the Prosecuting Attorney's Office had received related to McCall Donnelly School Board meeting and Yellow Pine Fire District meeting in which the Prosecuting Attorney's Office was responsible for investigation. He advised that the office had posted for an additional attorney, and they will begin interviews. He introduced Hannah Robertson who was hired as a legal assistant about a month ago.

Sheriff, Patti Bolen presented the Idaho Public Safety Communications Grant for Fiscal year 2022 & 2023. Commissioner Bingaman made a motion to allow the acceptance of the Idaho Public Safety Communications Grant for Fiscal Year 2022 & 2023. Commissioner Maupin

seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to allow the acceptance of the Idaho Public Safety Communications Grant for Fiscal Year 2022 & 2023. Sheriff Bolen reported on a multiple vehicle accident that had occurred last week.

Interim Treasurer, Jody Green provided an overview of the procedures that would be conducted within the Treasurer's Office to prepare for the tax drive for Tax Year 2021.

Human Resource Director, Pat Duncan presented on policy that she would like to bring to the commissioners regarding tidy and clean workspaces. Chairman Hasbrouck lead the discussion regarding the expectations of employee's workspaces to include department heads. The commissioners agreed to draft an email to send out.

Building Director, Annette Derrick provided an overview of work that had been conducted by the Building Department related to inspections and new building permits.

University of Idaho Extension Educator, Melissa Hamilton introduced Office Assistant, Jill Cassal and Jill addressed the commissioners. Melissa informed the commissioners that she interviewed for the Americorp position, and she advised that she has an offer out to an individual. Melissa provided an overview of additional work that she had been conducting for the past several weeks. She advised that she was working with VCROPs to do a ripple map assessment of the grant that was received. She presented that she had been working with the Arts Commission. She also briefly discussed the standard agreement between Valley County and the University of Idaho for extension services. The commissioners would like to have the matter on next weeks agenda for further discussion.

Human Resource Director, Pat Duncan informed the commissioners of training that she was scheduling for county employees. She also presented on job openings within Valley County.

IT Director, Jeremy Wilcox informed the commissioners about staffing within the IT Department. He provided a brief overview of work that the IT Department had been completing and working on. Commissioner Maupin asked about software that the IT Department had been researching for potential upgrades or transitions. Jeremy discussed the software that was being reviewed. Jeremy also presented on the capabilities of Laserfische and additional licenses that were needed.

Planning & Zoning Director, Cynda Herrick informed the commissioners that she would be attending the NORFMA on-line conference. Cynda reported on upcoming Planning & Zoning Commission Meetings and advised that they had been having two regular meetings each month. She also presented on additional work that she had been conducting.

Recreation Director, Larry Laxson provided an overview of discussions regarding Idaho Department of Land leases. He advised that the maintenance on the warming hut had been completed. He advised that the waterlines at Wellington Park had been repaired. He discussed the meeting that he attended regarding Cascade Pathways. He advised that he was working on a agreement with DF Development on snow grooming trails that were on DF Development Land. He advised that the Lands Allocation Committee had been placed on hold until the litigation of the wolverines had been resolved. Commissioner Bingaman asked if the Land Allocation Committee was still willing to convene. Larry discussed their interest. He presented on the

estimated cost for improving Clear Creek Park from Ok Gravel and he explained that he submitted estimated cost to Grant Writer, Mary Rosen to see if there were grants available. He discussed the trail work that was being conducted. Commissioner Maupin asked about the repairs to the roof at Wellington Park. Larry explained the bids that had been received to make the repair and he advised that he was discussing with Grant Writer, Mary Rosen to see if there were any grants that could be applied for.

Facilities/Solid Waste Director, Scott Clingan provided an update regarding maintenance that had been conducted by Buildings & Grounds. He advised that the remodeled house was ready for employee housing. He also presented that the remodel of the Emergency Operation Center was almost completed for the move of Valley County Dispatch. He discussed the light installation of the employee parking and the improvement of the outside lights around the courthouse. He advised that the backflow system at the McCall Annex needed to be repaired because it failed an inspection. He presented that elevator inspection needed to be completed. He discussed the letter that was sent to Warm Lake and North Lake Resort that they would not be able to utilize the Warm Lake Transfer Site for commercial use. He informed the commissioners that it was on the agenda next week for opening of janitorial bids, propane bids. Scott also presented on additional maintenance that they had been working on. The commissioners discussed the current poor conditions of the Solid Waste Transfer Site and the concerns that they have about the overflow of the existing site.

Road Director, Jeff McFadden advised that Mr. Greer Gardner with ITD was going to present to request the use of Sixty Lane. Mr. Gardner presented on ITD's request to utilize a piece of property owned by Valley County to store equipment during a Highway 55 asphalt improvement project. The commissioners had opportunity to ask questions to ITD and they responded. Planning & Zoning Director, Cynda Herrick explained that a Conditional Use Permit might be required but provided Idaho Code that could be used to determine that the project was necessary. Resident Engineer, Alan Burgenson presented the proposals from ITD to the commissioners to utilize the property for a staging site. Commissioner Maupin made a motion to allow the use of the Valley County property for gravel storage and equipment storage after engineering study was conducted by Idaho Transportation Department. Commissioner Bingaman seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to allow the use of the Valley County property for gravel storage and equipment storage after an engineering study was conducted by Idaho Transportation Department.

Road Director, Jeff McFadden presented the application for credit from Idaho Transmission Warehouse. Commissioner Bingaman made a motion to approve the credit application with Idaho Transmission Warehouse. Commissioner Maupin seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to approve the credit application with Idaho Transmission Warehouse.

Jeff informed the commissioners that property owners around Silver Fox Spur Road wanted to know what type of agreement was needed with Valley County. The commissioners requested that he submit a request to Civil Attorney, Brian Oakey to create an agreement.

Jeff reported on the road improvements that were made to Old State Highway. He discussed the improvements for East Lake Fork Road. He also discussed the patches that would be done on

Farm to Market Road. Commissioner Maupin asked for Jeff to provide a report of what grants the Road Department would be applying for in 2022.

Commissioner Bingaman presented on a letter of support for United Payette. He presented on amended wording that he would like to include in the letter of support. Commissioner Maupin made a motion to approve the letter of support for United Payette. Chairman Hasbrouck seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to approve the letter of support for United Payette.

The commissioners recessed at 11:53 a.m.

The commissioners returned at 1:00 p.m.

Chairman Hasbrouck explained that the commissioners were back from recess and the next matter on the agenda was update on commissioner's boards. Commissioner Maupin provided an update related to the possible closure of WICAP and explained that there was a need to have a joint meeting with the board members of WICAP. She provided an update of matters involving the West Central Economic Development Council. She advised that they were looking at hiring a part-time individual to review housing issue in Valley County. She also discussed that she was continuing to address childcare issues within Valley County. She advised that the economic summit had been canceled. She advised that she had resigned from the District IV Mental Health Board. She briefly touched on the Valley County Fair Board and the discussion that they would

like to have regarding possible expansion of fairgrounds. She advised that ATV Roundup had been canceled. She explained that due to other commitments she had not been able to attend the Valley Soil & Water Conservation District. She reported that SRS funding was still on hold and described where the bill was within congress. She discussed the process of the all-hazard mitigation plan. Commissioner Maupin presented on the Valley County Road Advisory Committee and the continued work that had been done within that committee. She advised that Jerry Robinson would be joining the committee during the next meeting. She advised that she would be attending the VCORP celebration on September 18, 2021.

Commissioner Bingaman advised that he had been working on statements to the Stibnite Mine proposal. He also presented that he was able to review the avalanche study. He discussed the work that he had been conducting regarding leasing of Idaho Department of Lands. He reported that Civil Attorney, Brian Oakey was reviewing potential memorandum of understandings and options. He presented on the Payette Forest Collation meetings. He discussed the Waterways Advisory Committee and options that were being reviewed for marine deputy housing. He presented on the work that had been done by the Logan Simpson on the waterway study and was hoping to see the data that was collected by volunteers. He discussed the Pathways Committee he had been participating on.

Chairman Hasbrouck presented on the LCPC group. He advised that the Donnelly Fire Commissioners were going to meet with Tamarack Resort regarding things that were promised but not been provided. Chairman Hasbrouck briefly talked about the Boise Forest Coalition and advised they would be meeting again in October. He discussed the District Four Central District Health Board and matters that were being discussed to include possibility of changing fees for restaurant inspections. He advised that Dr. Ryan Cole was ratified to be a part of the board.

4-H Coordinator, Alyson Statz provided a presentation to the commissioners regarding 4-H Structural Overview and presented a PowerPoint presentation. A copy of the presentation will be appended to the commissioners for review.

Members of the Valley County Social Committee presented the checks to the local charities Rose Advocates and Shepherd's Home after the Police vs Fire Department charity softball game. K.C. Mauk and Gabrielle Knapp presented a check to Rose Advocates. K.C. Mauk advised that the Valley County Social Committee hope that the charity game could continue again year after year.

Chairman Hasbrouck advised that the would be reconvening the Public Hearing that was tabled from August 23,2021, at 2:33 p.m. McCall City Planner, Brian Parker provided an updated staff report to the commissioners.

Commissioner Maupin advised that she had the engineers review the water table at the site and informed Commissioner Maupin that the water table was low. She advised that the engineers believed that 200 unit could be built on the Lake Fork site. She advised that the commissioners need to determine how much county resources and dollars should be invested in the proposed site. She provided options to be considered. Chairman Hasbrouck provided his opinion to the commissioners. It was explained that Valley County would need to go through a formal conditional use permit for any development of the Lake Fork site. The commissioners continued the discussion about the possibilities of utilizing the area. The commissioners also discussed the change in the area. Each commissioner had an opportunity to provide their opinion regarding either moving forward or ending the analysis of the area. Planning & Zoning Director, Cynda Herrick also provided her input and believed that it was a community issue and felt that the county should consider doing a request for proposal. Commissioner Maupin advised that she would continue to move forward with researching the possibility of the Lake Fork site.

Commissioner Bingaman made a motion to go into Executive Session per Idaho Code 74-206 1(f)-"to communicate with legal counsel for the public agency to discuss the legal ramifications of an legal options for pending litigation, or controversies not yet being litigated but imminently likely to be litigated. Commissioner Maupin seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to proceed with the recommendations of the Chief Prosecuting Attorney, Brian Oakey.

The commissioners began the interviews for the Valley County Treasurer at 3:50 p.m. The commissioners deliberated on the interviews that were conducted. Commissioner Maupin made a motion to appoint Johanna Defoort as Valley County Treasurer. Commissioner Bingaman seconded the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. Motion passed to appoint Johanna Defoort as the Valley County Treasurer.
