MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

PROWERS COUNTY

AND

A&B WATER ASSOCIATION

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this _____ day of _____,2025, by and between: Prowers County, Colorado, a governmental agency, 301 S. Main, Suite 215, Lamar, CO 81052 (hereinafter referred to as the "County"), and A&B Water Association, a nonprofit organization, PO Box 61, Holly, CO 81047 (hereinafter referred to as the "Association");

WHEREAS, the Association is in the process of developing a Water System Improvement project within the corporate limits of its service area, commonly known and referred to as Water System Improvement project (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, in conjunction with the Project, the County will submit a grant application and agreed to act as a sponsor of a Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") in the amount of \$100,000 for Design Engineering and Environmental Clearance (DEEC) with a potential of the submission of a Construction grant submission in the amount of \$600,000 (the "Grant") from the Department of Local Affairs, an agency of the State of Colorado, ("DOLA"); and

WHEREAS, Prowers County will execute the primary contract with DOLA after the required precontractual requirements are met within the approved Scope of Services that Prowers County, as contractor, "expect to carryout a major portion of the Project activities through the A&B Water Association, an eligible sub-recipient of Community Development Block Grant funds; who will own the water system improvements;" and

WHEREAS, it is both necessary and desirable for Prowers County to enter into this Agreement with A&B Water Association for purposes of setting forth the relative responsibilities of the parties with respect to the planning, development, and construction of the Project, and the expenditure of Grant funds in conjunction therewith; and

WHEREAS, it is the mutual desire of the parties to set forth their understanding and agreement, in writing, with respect to said obligations:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions, and obligations herein set forth, the parties agree:

- In consideration of Prowers County's willingness to act as the sponsor of the CDBG Grant and to enable Grant funding of the Project, A&B Water Association agrees as follows:
 - (a) A&B Water Association agrees that it shall manage, develop, and carry out construction of the project in conformity with all applicable building, zoning, and development regulations. The Project will be owned by A&B Water Association.
 - (b) A&B Water Association agrees to maintain and keep the property in a good and orderly condition and utilize it as a Water System Improvements within the A&B Water Association boundaries.
 - (c) A&B Water Association shall provide to Prowers County copies of all correspondence received from or sent to DOLA related to the utilization or expenditure of Grant funds as referenced in this contract, within the Grant application, or within any agreements with DOLA.
 - (d) A&B Water Association shall promptly comply with all financial management regulations, policies, guidelines and requirements as set forth in the most current edition of the Community Development Block Grant Housing Guidebook.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

- (e) A&B Water Association, in connection with this Project, agrees that it will carry out and comply with all of the rules, regulations and standards set forth in the DOLA "Guidebook for Public Facilities and Construction Projects" with respect to environmental protection, civil rights, property acquisition, relocation, labor and construction and project close-out.
- (f) A&B Water Association agrees that it will carry out all of the work elements in a satisfactory and proper manner, assure that the Grant funds are expended solely for Project activities and in the amounts budgeted under the Project responsibilities required by and set forth within Prowers County's contract with DOLA (Project No. TBD) as amended.
- (g) A&B Water Association agrees to follow and be bound by the "Residential Antidisplacement and Relocation Assistance Plan for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME).
- (h) A&B Water Association shall be responsible for the same audit requirements as Prowers County, as specified in Prowers County's contract with DOLA. A&B Water Association shall provide Prowers County with a copy of the annual audit report as required under the Single Audit Act of 1984, as amended in 1996, if required. If Prowers County is required to have a Single Audit annually as a result of this project or the receipt of other federal funds this requirement must also be met by A&B Water Association.
- A&B Water Association agrees to prepare all quarterly financial and performance reports, as required under the CDBG Guidelines and shall provide copies of such reports to Prowers County in a timely manner.
- 3. A&B Water Association shall prepare all requests for payment, which requests shall then be forwarded to Prowers County along with supporting documentation (invoices, check copies, purchase orders, etc.) to substantiate the request for a draw down of funds. After review, A&B Water Association shall forward the request to DOLA for payment. Upon receipt of payment, Prowers County shall forward the funds to A&B Water Association. A&B Water Association shall retain documentation evidencing that such funds were appropriately expended on the Project, and copies of checks and payment of bills by A&B Water Association shall be provided to Prowers County for its permanent records. If A&B Water Association receives an advance of CDBG funds from the State, A&B Water Association shall be required to submit copies of invoices, check copies, purchase orders or similar evidence of indebtedness to substantiate any draw down of CDBG funds from Prowers County.
- 4. Prior to any request for reimbursement for authorized activities to be funded under the Community Development Block Grant, A&B Water Association shall have in place all financing for the Project inclusive of construction financing, permanent financing, and any bridge loans, as required.
- 5. A&B Water Association shall provide certification to Prowers County and to DOLA that the selection of contractors and purchase of materials to accomplish the project shall follow and be in accordance with the appropriate procurement standards to the Community Block Grant Guidebook.
- A&B Water Association's request for final payment shall be submitted in accordance with the provisions set forth in the contract between Prowers County and DOLA, pertaining to Project No. TBD.
- 7. A&B Water Association agrees to comply with all other terms, conditions and obligations pertaining to the ownership, development, construction and management of the Project as required under any contractual documents executed by Prowers County with DOLA or the State of Colorado. In the event there is any liability accruing from inappropriate

expenditure of Grant funds by A&B Water Association, other than as a result of the negligence of Prowers County, A&B Water Association agrees to be responsible therefore.

- 8. Association shall defend, indemnify and hold County free and harmless from and against any and all liability, demands, claims, damages, suits, judgments, and decrees, costs, expenses and attorneys' fees, on account of injury to or death of any person or damage to any property arising out of or related to Association's performance of services and obligations hereunder, including, without limitation, its intentional or negligent acts, errors or omissions, by itself, its agents, officers, servants, and employees, subcontractors or assignees.
- 9. It is the intent of this Agreement to assure that all contractual obligations concerning the ownership, development, construction, and management of the Project shall be accomplished by A&B Water Association, and that the role of Prowers County in conjunction with said Project, other than planning and development approval, shall be limited to making application for the Community Development Block Grant funds and acting as a conduit for the authorized expenditure of such funds in accordance with the contractual documents.
- 10. Time is of the essence with respect to the covenants, conditions and obligations contained herein, as well as those set forth in the existing contracts pertaining to Project No. TBD involving DOLA and the State of Colorado.
- 11. The terms of this Agreement shall be binding upon the representative parties, their successors and assigns.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

For school health/nursing service to Eads School District, the district agrees to reimburse Prowers County Public Health and Environment \$13990.75 for the 2025-2026 school year. The terms of this agreement shall be from August 1, 2025 - May 31, 2026 and will include the services as described:

Dates of service: August 1, 2025 — May 31, 2026

Nursing services on site at Eads School for one service day per week during student contact hours and the week preceding the start of school.

Service days will equal 7.5 hours per day (from 8:00 a.m.to 4:00 p.m.) with \(^1/2\) hour lunch break.

Annual student health screenings will be scheduled and completed before October 31, 2025. This will allow time for re-screens and referrals.

School nursing staff will be available to all school staff for school nursing related questions/consultations via telephone or e mail when not on site.

School nursing services will be provided by a professional nurse with advanced skills that include the ability to supervise others, and delegate care in a community or school setting. These advanced skills are needed to address the complex health needs of students within the school community setting. These skills are attained through a baccalaureate degree in nursing.

Copies of Prowers County liability insurance will be provided upon approval of this contract upon request.

Additional school nursing services that will be provided that will enhance the level of care and service provided to Eads School includes:

- Continue to provide vaccinations to all students needing vaccinated including flu vaccinations in the fall to all students and staff. Creating easier services to the community and increased school immunization rates.
- Professional nursing that is involved and comprehensive in the requirements for mandated school services and potential for growth in the school health program for Eads school.
- Cross trained staff available in the event of a "school nurse" absence.
- Supervision, accountability, and oversight of school nursing services that are mandated by CDE.
- Deliver mandated delegation services to unlicensed personnel for medication administration and one to one delegation for children with special needs.
- All communications to parents, students, or community members must be approved by the Administration of Eads Schools, other than personal health care information or duties that fall within the scope of this agreement.

The Prowers County Public Health & Environment Director will be responsible for evaluation and supervision of staff involved in the provision of services with input from the school district staff.

Prowers County Public Health & Environment will invoice for payment, with the first half due by September 15, 2025, in the amount of \$6,995.37. Kiowa County Public Health INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR THE PROVISION of the About Families and Communities Engaged for Baca, Cheyenne, Kiowa, and Prowers County

I. Background/Legal Authority

In 2004, a group of Colorado State Legislators established the Collaborative Management Program (CMP) to encourage and incentivize collaboration on behalf of multi-system youth. Also known as HB04-1451, the CMP defined a county level framework for collaboration whereby mandated providers must partner through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and create an Interagency Oversight Group (IOG). These mandated partners include the following: Department Human Services, Division of Youth Services, Public Health, Mental Health, Domestic Abuse Provider, Regional Accountable Entity, Managed Service Organization, School District(s), and Judicial/Probation.

In September 2014, the identified mandatory partners in Baca, Cheyenne, Kiowa, and Prowers counties each formed an Interagency Oversight Group (IOG) also known as the About Families and Communities Engaged (About F.A.C.E. IOG), for their respective counties, to provide services to children and families who would benefit from integrated multi-agency services.

Colorado Revised Statute 24-1.9-104(3)(a): On and after July 1, 2005, the executive director of the department of human services shall allocate the money in the fund, and any general fund money appropriated for this purpose, to parties to a memorandum of understanding who have agreed to collaborative management pursuant to section 24-1.9-102. The executive director of the department of human services shall:

(I) Beginning July 1, 2023, distribute additional funds appropriated for the 2023-24 state fiscal year to the fund to existing collaborative management programs pursuant to the funding formula in place on June 30, 2023;

(II) Beginning July 1, 2024, provide an annual sum to each local collaborative management program to provide services to children who would benefit from integrated multi-agency services, including children who have had contact with law enforcement or who are at risk of involvement with the juvenile justice system. For the 2024-25 state fiscal year and each state fiscal year thereafter, the amount of the sum provided to each local collaborative management program must be determined through a funding formula that considers:

(A) The amount of money available in the fund;

(B) the need for a base of resources to direct a child and the child's family members to appropriate services; and

(C) the number of children in the population to be served, as defined by the memorandum of understanding pursuant to section 24-1.9-102, in each county or region.

II. Purpose

This Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) is made between Kiowa County Public Health and the County Departments of Human/Social Services of Baca, Cheyenne, Kiowa, and Prowers for the purpose of employing and administrating each of the counties About F.A.C.E. CMP.

The said counties have entered into this Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA), which shall be in effect from July 1, 2025 through December 31, 2026 to provide fiscal oversight for the operations and employment of the About F.A.C.E. CMP Coordinator in Baca, Cheyenne, Kiowa, and Prowers Counties.

III. Deliverables

- A. Department of Human/Social Service responsibilities:
 - 1. Transfer CMP incentive funds to Kiowa County Public Health. Each county will provide timely contributions to the Operations Budget, as agreed upon by the IOG's and as invoiced by Kiowa County Public Health.
 - 2. Actively participate in monthly IOG meetings.
 - 3. Participate in ISST meetings.
 - 4. Ensure all statutorily required data is provided to the CMP Coordinator.
 - 5. Provide Coordinator information needed to complete the annual CMP report.
 - 6. Submit monthly financial reports by the second Wednesday of each month outlining expenditures and present this up-to-date report at each IOG meeting.
 - 7. Only expend CMP funds that have been approved through the IOG, ISST request and Financial Subcommittee review.
 - 8. Maintain financial systems and billings to ensure that contract funds are allocated and expended in accordance with the terms of the agreement.
- B. Kiowa County Public Health/CMP Coordinator responsibilities:
 - 1. Provide supervision and guidance to the About F.A.C.E. CMP Coordinator.
 - 2. Ensure the CMP Coordinator is up to date on any relevant training.
 - 3. Provide a program report to the IOG's at each regular meeting to include an Operations Budget report, the number of clients served, progress and activity, and stakeholder outreach.
 - 4. Coordinate and review the annual MOU with each participating mandatory partner for each county and submit the Draft MOU's to CDHS by May 1st of

each year for review. The final MOU with signatures will be submitted to CDHS by June 30th of each year.

- 5. Complete the CMP annual report and submit the approved report to the Colorado Department of Human Services by July 31st of each year, and present it to the IOG at the following regular monthly meeting each year.
- 6. Ensure all aspects of the deliverables are completed.

7. Review and analysis of:

- a. Individual performance of the About F.A.C.E. Coordinator to ensure the quality of the services being provided and the effectiveness of those services are addressing the needs of the families and service coordinators involved in the program.
- b. Current program information to determine the extent to which the About F.A.C.E. Coordinator achieves established contractual goals.
- c. Manage any performance issues and develop interventions that will resolve concerns.
- d. Financial systems and billings to ensure that contract funds are allocated and expended in accordance with the terms of the agreement.
- e. Kiowa County will bill a maximum indirect rate of 20.35% for the 2025 State Fiscal Year, which is subject to change annually in 2026.
- 8. Monitor to ensure that the requirements of the contract document, meet Federal, State, and County regulation policies.

IV. Duration and Terms of Agreement

This agreement becomes effective upon signature approval of all parties for a period of one year. This agreement can be terminated at any time within the year if thirty (30) days written notice is given. Renewal of this agreement will occur on an annual basis by approval of all parties and contingent upon available funding.

In the event that any of the About F.A.C.E. IOG's are dissolved due to the departure of a mandatory member, as defined by statute, an emergency meeting of the IOG members will be called within seven (7) days to vote upon distribution of remaining funds and property. Distribution of remaining funds and property will be decided upon by a majority vote of 51% of the remaining members.

V. Revisions or Amendments

This agreement may be revised or amended only by the signatures of the parties to the agreement or their official successors.

PURCHASE OF SERVICES CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT entered into this 11th day of August, 2025 by and between Prowers County Department of Human Services, STATE OF COLORADO, hereinafter referred to as "Prowers County", whose address is 1001 South Main Street, Lamar, CO 81052 and Marcus Abitia, hereinafter referred to as "Independent Contractor", whose address is Lamar, CO 81052.

Witnesseth,

Whereas, the parties wish to enter into an Independent Contractor Agreement whereby Independent Contractor will furnish certain services to Prowers County upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Term.</u> This contract will be effective from this date until the project is completed, unless terminated as set forth herein.
- 2. <u>Services by Independent Contractor</u>. Independent Contractor agrees to perform the duties as outlined in the Proposal dated <u>08/11/25</u> (attached hereto as Exhibit A).
- 3. <u>Contract Price</u>. Prowers County will pay Independent Contractor as set forth in Exhibit A upon receipt of a satisfactory invoice.
- 4. <u>Taxes.</u> Independent Contractor understands that Independent Contractor is obligated to pay all federal and state income tax on all money earned while performing services for Prowers County.
- 5. <u>Indemnify</u>. Independent Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Prowers County from any action based upon or arising out of damage or injury, including death, to persons or property caused or sustained in connection with the performance of this contract or by conditions created thereby, or based upon any violation of any statute, regulation, and the defense of such claims or actions. Independent Contractor waives any and all claims against Prowers County.
- 6. <u>Insurance</u>. It is understood that Independent Contractor will furnish its own insurance and will not be eligible for insurance maintained by Prowers County for its employees, including health insurance, workers' compensation insurance, unemployment insurance, life insurance and all other benefits afforded employees.
- 7. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Independent Contractor certifies under penalty of perjury that it is an independent contractor and is not an employee of Prowers County.

Independent Contractor further certifies that Prowers County does not require Independent Contractor to work only for Prowers County, Prowers County does not establish a quality standard for the individual except that Prowers County may provide plans and specifications regarding work but cannot oversee the actual work or instruct Independent Contractor as to how work will be performed, Prowers County does not pay Individual Contractor a salary or an hourly rate but rather a fixed or contract rate as above set forth, Prowers County does not terminate the work of the service provided during the contract period unless Independent Contractor violates the terms of this contract or fails to produce a result that meets the specifications of this contract, Prowers County does not provide any training for Independent Contractor, Prowers County does not provide tools or benefits to Independent Contractor except that materials and equipment may be supplied, Prowers County does not dictate the time of performance except that a completion schedule and a range of agreeable work hours may be established, Prowers County does not pay Independent Contractor personally but rather payments will be made to the trade or business name of Independent Contractor and Prowers County does not combine the business operations in any way with Independent Contractor's business operations instead of maintaining all such operations separately and Independent Contractor further understands that in the event of injury Independent Contractor will not be entitled to any workers' compensation benefits and that Independent Contractor is required to provide Workers' Compensation Insurance for it and for all workers that Independent Contractor hires. Proof of coverage of Workers' Compensation Insurance shall be provided by Independent Contractor to Prowers County upon execution hereof. Independent Contractor agrees to execute any documents which may be required by the Workers' Compensation Insurance carrier of Prowers County to certify this Independent Contractor Agreement.

The Contractor shall perform its duties hereunder as an Independent Contractor and not as an employee, neither the Contractor nor any agent or employee of the Contractor shall be or shall be deemed to be an agent or employee of Owner. Contractor shall pay when due all required employment taxes and income tax and local head tax on any monies paid by Owner pursuant to this contract. Contractor acknowledges that the Contractor and its employees are not entitled to unemployment insurance benefits unless the Contractor or third party provides such coverage and that Owner does not pay for or otherwise provide such coverage. Contractor shall have no authorization, express or implied, to bind Owner to any agreements, liability, or understanding except as expressly set forth herein. NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Term.</u> This contract will be effective from this date until the project is completed, unless terminated as set forth herein.
- 2. <u>Services by Independent Contractor</u>. Independent Contractor agrees to perform the duties as outlined in the Proposal dated <u>08/11/25</u> (attached hereto as Exhibit A).
- 3. <u>Contract Price</u>. Prowers County will pay Independent Contractor as set forth in Exhibit A upon receipt of a satisfactory invoice.
- 4. <u>Taxes.</u> Independent Contractor understands that Independent Contractor is obligated to pay all federal and state income tax on all money earned while performing services for Prowers County.
- 5. <u>Indemnify</u>. Independent Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Prowers County from any action based upon or arising out of damage or injury, including death, to persons or property caused or sustained in connection with the performance of this contract or by conditions created thereby, or based upon any violation of any statute, regulation, and the defense of such claims or actions. Independent Contractor waives any and all claims against Prowers County.
- 6. <u>Insurance</u>. It is understood that Independent Contractor will furnish its own insurance and will not be eligible for insurance maintained by Prowers County for its employees, including health insurance, workers' compensation insurance, unemployment insurance, life insurance and all other benefits afforded employees.
- 7. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Independent Contractor certifies under penalty of perjury that it is an independent contractor and is not an employee of Prowers County.

Independent Contractor further certifies that Prowers County does not require Independent Contractor to work only for Prowers County, Prowers County does not establish a quality standard for the individual except that Prowers County may provide plans and specifications regarding work but cannot oversee the actual work or instruct Independent Contractor as to how work will be performed, Prowers County does not pay Individual Contractor a salary or an hourly rate but rather a fixed or contract rate as above set forth, Prowers County does not terminate the work of the service provided during the contract period unless Independent Contractor violates the terms of this contract or fails to produce a result that meets the specifications of this contract, Prowers County does not provide any training for Independent Contractor, Prowers County does not provide tools or benefits to Independent Contractor except that materials and equipment may be supplied, Prowers County does not dictate the time of performance except that a completion schedule and a range of agreeable work hours may be established. Prowers County does not pay Independent Contractor personally but rather payments will be made to the trade or business name of Independent Contractor and Prowers County does not combine the business operations in any way with Independent Contractor's business operations instead of maintaining all such operations separately and Independent Contractor further understands that in the event of injury Independent Contractor will not be entitled to any workers' compensation benefits and that Independent Contractor is required to provide Workers' Compensation Insurance for it and Proof of coverage of Workers' for all workers that Independent Contractor hires. Compensation Insurance shall be provided by Independent Contractor to Prowers County upon execution hereof. Independent Contractor agrees to execute any documents which may be required by the Workers' Compensation Insurance carrier of Prowers County to certify this Independent Contractor Agreement.

The Contractor shall perform its duties hereunder as an Independent Contractor and not as an employee, neither the Contractor nor any agent or employee of the Contractor shall be or shall be deemed to be an agent or employee of Owner. Contractor shall pay when due all required employment taxes and income tax and local head tax on any monies paid by Owner pursuant to this contract. Contractor acknowledges that the Contractor and its employees are not entitled to unemployment insurance benefits unless the Contractor or third party provides such coverage and that Owner does not pay for or otherwise provide such coverage. Contractor shall have no authorization, express or implied, to bind Owner to any agreements, liability, or understanding except as expressly set forth herein. Contractor shall provide and keep in force workers' compensation (and provide proof of such insurance when requested by Owner) and unemployment compensation insurance in the amounts required by law, and shall be solely responsible for the acts of the Contractor, its employees and agents.

- 8. <u>Special Provisions</u>. Independent Contractor agrees not to assign any provision of this contract to a subcontractor, unless approved in writing in advance by Prowers County, and to provide Prowers County with reports and maintain records on the provision of services.
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- 16. <u>Binding Effect</u>. This Agreement is binding upon the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns. This Agreement is only for the benefit of the parties hereto, and no third party shall have any right, claim or interest hereunder. There is no implied covenant of good faith and fair dealing in this Agreement, rather it will be enforced as written.

APPROVING AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN PROWERS COUNTY, COLORADO AND BENT COUNTY, COLORADO, ESTABLISHING THE MAY VALLEY WATER AUTHORITY TO BE LOCATED IN BENT COUNTY

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County are each duly and regularly created, organized and existing political subdivisions and public bodies corporate of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County are authorized by the provisions of Colo. Const. Art. XIV, §18, and C.R.S. 29-1-201, *et seq.*, to enter into contracts with other political subdivisions of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County are authorized by the provision of C.R.S. §29-1-204.2 to establish a water authority to be used to effect the development of water resources, systems and facilities, in whole or in part, for the benefit of the inhabitants and service users of the contracting parties or others at the discretion of the board of directors of the authority; and

WHEREAS, in order for the May Valley Water Association to obtain federal grants and low interest rate loans from the Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority, May Valley Water Association is required to be organized as a local government for state law purposes; and

WHEREAS, in order to become organized as a local government, May Valley Water Association approached Prowers and Bent Counties requesting that they form a water authority pursuant to their statutory powers to better serve the residents and rate payers of the May Valley Water Association system; and

WHEREAS, there has been presented to the Boards of County Commissioners of Prowers and Bent Counties the form of Establishing Contract for the May Valley Water Authority; and

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County have determined it is in the best interests of their constituents and service users to establish a water authority to be known as the May Valley Water Authority to provide water service within portions of Bent County and Prowers County; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PROWERS COUNTY, COLORADO (THE "BOARD"):

Section 1) Approval of Establishing Contract and Ratification and Approval of Prior Actions. The Board of County Commissioners hereby approves the May Valley Water Authority Establishing Contract in the form presented at this meeting. All action heretofore taken (not inconsistent with the provisions of this resolution) by the Board, or the officers or agents of the Board or the County, relating to the formation of the May Valley Water Authority is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed.

Section 2) <u>Findings Relating to the May Valley Water Authority</u>. The Board hereby finds and determines that pursuant to Section 29-1-204.2, C.R.S., the creation of the May Valley Water

Authority is necessary for the development of water resources, systems, or facilities or of drainage facilities in whole or in part for the benefit of the inhabitants of Prowers County and Bent County.

Section 3) Finding of Best Interests. The Board hereby finds and determines the creation of the May Valley Water Authority is necessary, convenient and in furtherance of the County's purposes and is in the best interests of the inhabitants of the County; and the Board hereby authorizes and approves such creation.

Section 4) <u>Authorization to Execute Collateral Documents</u>. Any member of the Board of County Commissioners, the County Manager, or other appropriate officials or agents of the Board or the County, are hereby authorized to execute and deliver for and on behalf of the County any and all additional certificates, documents, instruments and other papers, and to perform all other acts that they may deem necessary or appropriate, in order to implement and carry out the transactions and other matters authorized by this resolution, including but not limited to the execution of the May Valley Water Authority Establishing Contract and such other documents, certificates and affidavits as may be necessary. The execution of any instrument by the aforementioned officers or members of the Board shall be conclusive evidence of the approval by the Board of such instrument in accordance with the terms hereof and thereof.

Section 5) Repealer. All bylaws, orders and resolutions of the Board, or parts thereof, inconsistent with this resolution or with the May Valley Water Authority Establishing Contract hereby approved, are hereby repealed only to the extent of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed as reviving any bylaw, order or resolution of the Board, or part thereof, heretofore repealed.

Section 6) <u>Effective Date</u>. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and adoption.

MCCLAVE WATER AUTHORITY ESTABLISHING CONTRACT

THIS MCCLAVE WATER AUTHORITY ESTABLISHING CONTRACT ("Contract") is made and entered into, effective as of August 26, 2025 ("Establishment Date") by and between Bent County, Colorado ("Bent County"), and Prowers County, Colorado ("Prowers County"), each a duly and regularly created, organized and existing political subdivision and public body corporate and politic, existing as such under and by virtue of the Constitution and laws of the State of Colorado, individually referred to herein as a "Member" and collectively referred to herein as the "Members."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County are each duly and regularly created, organized and existing political subdivisions and public bodies corporate of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County are authorized by the provisions of Colo. Const. Art. XIV, §18, and C.R.S. 29-1-201, *et seq.*. to enter into contracts with other political subdivisions of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County are authorized by the provision of C.R.S. §29-1-204.2 to establish a water authority to be used to effect the development of water resources, systems and facilities, in whole or in part, for the benefit of the inhabitants and service users of the contracting parties or others at the discretion of the board of directors of the authority; and

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County have determined it is in the best interests of their constituents and service users to establish a water authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing Recitals, which are incorporated by reference into this Contract, and in consideration of the mutual promises and undertakings herein, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1. NAME OF AUTHORITY

1.1. <u>Name</u>. The name of the entity hereby established shall be the McClave Water Authority ("Authority").

ARTICLE 2. PURPOSE AND TERM OF AUTHORITY

- 2.1. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of the Authority is to affect the development of systems and facilities for purposes of furnishing a potable water supply for the benefit of the Members and their constituents and the Authority's service users. By this Contract, the Members intend to establish an entity for the purposes of financing, designing, constructing, acquiring, operating, maintaining, and utilizing water resources, facilities and services of such Authority in conjunction and cooperation with the Members.
- 2.2. <u>Term.</u> In accordance with C.R.S. §29-1-204.2(2)(d), this Contract shall continue until terminated pursuant to a written resolution and unanimous vote of the Board of Directors of the Authority in favor of termination and by ratification of such termination by the governing

bodies of each of the Members. However, this Contract may not be terminated so long as the Authority has bonds, notes or other obligations outstanding, unless provision for full payment of such obligations, by escrow or otherwise, has been made by the Board of Directors of the Authority pursuant to terms of such obligations at the time of termination.

2.3. <u>Termination</u>. In the event of the termination of this Contract and dissolution of the Authority, all rights, title and interest of the Authority in the General Assets (as hereinafter defined) of the Authority shall be conveyed to the McClave Water Association, subject to any outstanding liens, mortgages or other pledges of such General Assets. The term "General Assets" as used herein shall include all legal and equitable interests in real or personal property, tangible or intangible, of the Authority.

ARTICLE 3. GOVERNING BODY

- 3.1 <u>Board of Directors.</u> The Board of Directors (the "Board" and the "Directors") shall consist of five (5) Directors initially appointed by the Bent County Board of County Commissioners (the "BOCC"). Any person appointed by the BOCC to serve as a Director on the Board must be a user of water services provided by the Authority, as evidenced by the ownership of a meter (each a "Water User"). Water Users wishing to be considered for appointment as a Director may apply to the BOCC or be recommended to the BOCC.
 - 3.1.1. The Directors appointed to the initial Board (the "Initial Board"), and the end of each Director's initial term shall be as set forth below:

- 3.1.2. <u>Term of Directors</u>. Except for the Initial Board, each Director shall serve a term of four years. However, the terms of the Initial Board shall be staggered so that the first term of each Director shall be as follows: the first two Directors appointed by the BOCC shall serve a two-year term and the next three Directors appointed by the BOCC shall serve four-year terms. Upon expiration of a term, a Director shall continue to serve until a successor Director has been appointed by the BOCC. Nothing herein shall preclude re-appointment of a Director by the BOCC for consecutive terms.
- 3.1.3. <u>Vacancy</u>. A vacancy occurring on the Board, for reasons other than expiration of the outgoing Director's term of office shall be filled by the selection of a successor Director by the current Directors, who shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term. The BOCC may remove a Director which it appointed with or without cause. At the expiration of any term of office for a Director(s), any vacant seat on the Board shall be appointed by the current

Directors, or if there are no current Directors, by the BOCC.

- 3.1.4. <u>Board Shall Conduct Business of the Authority.</u> The Governing Body of the Authority shall be the Board, in which all administrative and legislative power of the Authority is vested. The Board shall conduct the business of the Authority in good faith and utilizing a reasonable businessperson standard.
- 3.1.5. Expansion of Board of Directors. Upon the increase in Membership of the Authority as provided by Article 6, or upon Amendments to this Contract approved by the current Members as provided in Article 7, the number of Directors of the Authority's Board of Directors may be increased. However, no such Amendment shall result in the number of Directors being an even number.
- 3.2. <u>Meetings.</u> Regular meetings of the Board shall be held at such place, on such day, and at such hour as the Board shall, by resolution, from time to time establish. Special meetings may be held at any time and at any place within the State of Colorado provided at least twenty-four (24) hours' notice is provided to each Director. The President or Vice President may, and on the written request of two (2) Directors, shall, call a special meeting of the Board. Any director may include an item for discussion or action on the Board agenda, provided that such item or action is submitted for inclusion on the Board agenda at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the commencement of the meeting. The Authority is a political subdivision and public corporation of the State of Colorado, separate from the Members, within the meaning of the Colorado Open Meeting Law, C.R.S. §24-6-401, *et seq*.
- 3.2.1. <u>Quorum.</u> A quorum of the Board of Directors is more than one-half of the number of Directors serving on the Board. A quorum shall be necessary for any action to be taken by the Board.
- 3.2.2. <u>Voting</u>. Unless otherwise specifically provided for herein, a vote of a majority of the Directors in attendance at a meeting of the Authority shall be sufficient for action to be taken by the Board, provided a quorum is in attendance and available to vote on the action.
- 3.3. Officers and Duties. The Directors shall elect annually at the first meeting of each calendar year, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, provided however, that the Secretary may be a person other than a Director, and provided further that the same person may serve as both Secretary and Treasurer (provided that such Secretary/Treasurer is a Director). The President shall chair all meetings. Whenever the President is absent, the Vice-President shall assume all duties of the President. The Secretary shall keep in a visual text format that may be transmitted electronically, a record of all the Authority's proceedings, minutes of all meetings, certificates, contracts, bonds given by employees, and all corporate acts. The Treasurer shall keep strict and accurate accounts of all money received by or disbursed for and on behalf of the Authority in permanent records.

- 3.4. <u>Budgets</u>, <u>Accounting and Audits</u>. The Board shall comply with C.R.S. §29-1-204.2(2)(b)(IV) and all other applicable State and Federal laws and shall make provisions for annual budgets, and audits when required, in accordance with local government accounting standards including Parts 1, 5 and 6, Article 1, Title 29, C.R.S., as amended. Annual budgets and the results of any audits shall be presented to each Member no more than 30 days after review by the Board.
- 3.5. <u>Indemnification</u>. The Authority shall, to the extent permitted by law, indemnify and defend each Director, officer and employee of the Authority in connection with any claim or actual or threatened suit, action, or proceeding in which he or she may be involved in his or her official capacity by reason of his or her being or having been such Director or officer, or by reason or any action or omission by him or her in any such capacity. The Authority shall have no obligation to indemnify and defend any such Director or officer for any claim, suit, action or proceeding arising out of criminal offenses or willful and wanton misconduct of such Director or officer.

ARTICLE 4. POWERS OF THE AUTHORITY

- 4.1. The Authority shall have all general powers of an authority organized and operating pursuant to C.R.S. §29-1-204.2, which include the following:
- 4.1.1. To develop water resources, systems or facilities or conveyance and drainage facilities in connection to water treatment, in whole or in part for the benefit of the inhabitants or service users of the Members, at the discretion of the Board of Directors of the Authority, subject to fulfilling any conditions or requirements set forth in this Contract;
 - 4.1.2. To make and enter into contracts:
 - 4.1.3. To employ agents and employees;
- 4.1.4. To acquire, construct, manage, maintain, or operate water systems, facilities, works, or improvements, or drainage facilities, or any interest therein;
- 4.1.5. To acquire, hold, lease (as lessor or lessee), sell, or otherwise dispose of any real or personal property utilized for the purposes of water treatment, distribution, and wastewater disposal, or of conveyance and drainage;
- 4.1.6. To condemn property for use as rights-of-way only if such property is not owned by any public utility and devoted to such public use pursuant to state authority;
 - 4.1.7. To incur debts, liabilities, or obligations:
 - 4.1.8. To sue and be sued in its own name;
 - 4.1.9. To have and use a corporate seal;
- 4.1.10. To fix, maintain, and revise fees, rates, and charges for functions, services or facilities provided by the entity;

- 4.1.11. To adopt, by resolution, regulations respecting the exercise of its powers and the carrying out of its purpose;
- 4.1.12. To exercise any other powers which are essential to the provisions of functions, services, or facilities by the entity and which are specified in this contract;
- 4.1.13. To do and perform any acts and things authorized by this Contract, under, through, or by means of an agent or by contracts with any person, firm, or corporation;
- 4.1.14. To provide for the rehabilitation of any surfaces adversely affected by the construction of water pipelines, facilities, or systems or of drainage facilities through the rehabilitation of plant cover, soil stability, and other measures appropriate to the subsequent beneficial use of such lands;
- 4.1.15. To operate as an "Enterprise" under Colorado Constitution Article X, Section 20 if deemed desirable by the Board or if the Authority is determined to be a "District" under Colorado Constitution Article X, Section 20.
- 4.2. <u>Financial Powers.</u> The Authority is a political subdivision and a political corporation of the State of Colorado, separate from the Members. It shall have the duties, privileges, immunities, rights and liabilities of a public body politic and corporate. The provision of Articles 10.5 and 47 of Title 11, C.R.S., shall apply to moneys of the Authority.
- 4.2.1. The bonds, notes, and other obligations of the Authority shall not be the debts, liabilities, or obligations of the Members.
- 4.2.2. The Authority is authorized to receive funds from proprietary revenues for services rendered by the Authority, from proprietary revenues or other public funds as contributions to defray the cost of any purpose set forth in this Contract and from proprietary revenues or other public funds as advances for any purpose subject to repayment by the Authority.
- 4.2.3. To carry out the purposes for which the Authority is established, the Authority is authorized to issue bonds, notes, or other obligations payable solely from the revenues derived from the function, service, system or facility or the combined functions, services, systems, or facilities of the Authority or from any other available funds of the Authority. The terms, conditions, and details of said bonds, notes, and other obligations, the procedures related thereto, and the refunding thereof shall be set forth in the resolution authorizing said bonds, notes or other obligations.

ARTICLE 5. SERVICES OF THE AUTHORITY

- 5.1. <u>Standards of Service</u>. Any improvements operated by the Authority shall substantially comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes, regulations, ordinances, permits and orders, including without limitation, the Federal Clean Water Act and Safe Drinking Water Act. Where applicable, the Authority shall promulgate water quality standards, treatment standards and discharge standards for all Authority improvements.
- 5.2. Water Treatment for Customers. The Authority shall treat and deliver water to its Water Users and customers from supplies, including augmentation supplies, owned, leased, dedicated to, or otherwise available to be used by the Authority. Any Member may enter into a separate contract with the Authority, as authorized pursuant to C.R.S. § 29-1-203, which shall define the terms and extent of the service provided by the Authority to the Member(s) and the obligations of any Member for delivery of water supplies (the "Member's IGA"). Any Member's IGA with the Authority may be amended from time to time as necessary to reflect changes in the Authority's service responsibilities and capabilities.
- 5.3. Rates and Charges. The Authority shall impose and collect reasonable operating rates and charges to recover the costs of operating, maintaining, repairing, replacing, and as necessary, expanding infrastructure and improvements and paying debt service on its bonds, loans or other obligations. Such rates and charges shall be established by the Board and modified as necessary. Rates and charges may include reasonable allocations of general and administrative overhead expenses. The Board may establish different rates and charges for different categories of Water Users and for providing water directly to the Members.

ARTICLE 6. TRANSFER OF ASSETS AND ASSUMPTION OF OBLIGATIONS AND LIABILITIES; ASSIGNMENT AND ADDITION OF MEMBER ENTITIES

- 6.1. Transfer of Assets and Assumption of Obligations and Liabilities. Some or all assets of the existing McClave Water Association (other than the water rights currently owned by the McClave Water Association which may or may not be transferred at the discretion of the McClave Water Association and the Board) may be transferred to the Authority upon execution of this Agreement and from time to time thereafter. The Authority shall assume all obligations and liabilities of the McClave Water Association under existing contracts and to which the McClave Water Association is a party.
- 6.2. <u>Assignment of Membership.</u> Each Member shall be entitled to assign their interest in this Contract to another political subdivision of the State of Colorado authorized to own and operate water systems or facilities, which entity is not already a Member to this Contract. Any such assignment must be approved by the Board prior to transfer of interest, including any terms and conditions the Board finds necessary and proper. No partial assignment shall be recognized. In event of an assignment of Membership, the governing body of the new Member shall ratify the then current terms of this Contract and cause an addendum to this Contract to be executed.

- 6.3. <u>Additional Members.</u> Additional political subdivisions of the State of Colorado authorized to own and operate water systems or facilities may become Members upon unanimous approval by the Board. In the event a new Member is approved by the Board, this Contract shall be amended to acknowledge the new Member and make additional changes as may be needed. Any such amendment must be ratified by the governing body of each Member.
- 6.4. <u>Deletion of Member</u>. Until there are more than two parties to this contract, the provisions for termination of the Authority shall govern the deletion of a party from this Contract. If an additional Member is added, the amendment to this Contract adding the new Member shall determine the procedure for deleting a Member.

ARTICLE 7. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 7.1. <u>Amendment.</u> No amendment to this Contract, including an amendment adding parties to the Contract in the future, shall be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the Authority and each Member. An amendment to add a Member to this Contract shall specify the conditions and requirements to be fulfilled by the new Member.
- 7.2. <u>Partial Invalidity</u>. If any portion of this Contract is determined by a court having jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remaining portions of this Contract, the intention being that the various provisions of this Contract are severable.
- 7.3. <u>Governing Law.</u> This Contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Colorado without regard to choice of law analysis and applicable federal law.
- 7.4. <u>Fiscal Year.</u> The fiscal year of the Authority shall begin on the first day of January in each year.
- 7.5. <u>Authority.</u> Each party hereto represents and warrants that it has all requisite power, corporate or otherwise, to execute, deliver and perform their obligations pursuant to this Contract. Each party hereto represents and warrants to the other that the execution, delivery and performance of this Contract has been duly authorized by it, and that upon execution and delivery, this Contract will constitute a legal, valid and binding obligation, enforceable against it in accordance with the terms of this Contract.
- 7.6. <u>Notices.</u> If under the terms of this Contract, or as needed in the regular business of the Authority, notice is to be provided to any Member, said notice shall be deemed provided upon personal delivery or after providing electronic notice of the same. The names or address to whom notice is to be sent may be modified by the affected Member by a written notice in writing to the Authority. Until so modified, the persons to receive notice are as follows:

This Contract constitutes the entire agreement among the parties pertaining to the subject matter of this Contract and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings of the parties as to the subject matter of this Contract. No representation, warranty, covenant, agreement or condition not expressed in this Contract shall be binding upon the parties or shall change or restrict the provisions of this Contract.
- 7.9. <u>Governmental Immunity</u> Nothing in this Contract shall be construed as a waiver of the rights and privileges of the Members pursuant to the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. §24-10-101, *et seq*.

7.10. <u>Counterparts.</u> This Contract may be executed in one or more counterparts, all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

APPROVING AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN PROWERS COUNTY, COLORADO AND BENT COUNTY, COLORADO, ESTABLISHING THE MAY VALLEY WATER AUTHORITY TO BE LOCATED IN BENT COUNTY

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County are each duly and regularly created, organized and existing political subdivisions and public bodies corporate of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County are authorized by the provisions of Colo. Const. Art. XIV, §18, and C.R.S. 29-1-201, *et seq.*, to enter into contracts with other political subdivisions of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County are authorized by the provision of C.R.S. §29-1-204.2 to establish a water authority to be used to effect the development of water resources, systems and facilities, in whole or in part, for the benefit of the inhabitants and service users of the contracting parties or others at the discretion of the board of directors of the authority; and

WHEREAS, in order for the May Valley Water Association to obtain federal grants and low interest rate loans from the Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority, May Valley Water Association is required to be organized as a local government for state law purposes; and

WHEREAS, in order to become organized as a local government, May Valley Water Association approached Prowers and Bent Counties requesting that they form a water authority pursuant to their statutory powers to better serve the residents and rate payers of the May Valley Water Association system; and

WHEREAS, there has been presented to the Boards of County Commissioners of Prowers and Bent Counties the form of Establishing Contract for the May Valley Water Authority; and

WHEREAS, Prowers County and Bent County have determined it is in the best interests of their constituents and service users to establish a water authority to be known as the May Valley Water Authority to provide water service within portions of Bent County and Prowers County; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PROWERS COUNTY, COLORADO (THE "BOARD"):

Section 1) Approval of Establishing Contract and Ratification and Approval of Prior Actions. The Board of County Commissioners hereby approves the May Valley Water Authority Establishing Contract in the form presented at this meeting. All action heretofore taken (not inconsistent with the provisions of this resolution) by the Board, or the officers or agents of the Board or the County, relating to the formation of the May Valley Water Authority is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed.

Section 2) <u>Findings Relating to the May Valley Water Authority</u>. The Board hereby finds and determines that pursuant to Section 29-1-204.2, C.R.S., the creation of the May Valley Water

Authority is necessary for the development of water resources, systems, or facilities or of drainage facilities in whole or in part for the benefit of the inhabitants of Prowers County and Bent County.

Section 3) Finding of Best Interests. The Board hereby finds and determines the creation of the May Valley Water Authority is necessary, convenient and in furtherance of the County's purposes and is in the best interests of the inhabitants of the County; and the Board hereby authorizes and approves such creation.

Section 4) <u>Authorization to Execute Collateral Documents</u>. Any member of the Board of County Commissioners, the County Manager, or other appropriate officials or agents of the Board or the County, are hereby authorized to execute and deliver for and on behalf of the County any and all additional certificates, documents, instruments and other papers, and to perform all other acts that they may deem necessary or appropriate, in order to implement and carry out the transactions and other matters authorized by this resolution, including but not limited to the execution of the May Valley Water Authority Establishing Contract and such other documents, certificates and affidavits as may be necessary. The execution of any instrument by the aforementioned officers or members of the Board shall be conclusive evidence of the approval by the Board of such instrument in accordance with the terms hereof and thereof.

Section 5) Repealer. All bylaws, orders and resolutions of the Board, or parts thereof, inconsistent with this resolution or with the May Valley Water Authority Establishing Contract hereby approved, are hereby repealed only to the extent of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed as reviving any bylaw, order or resolution of the Board, or part thereof, heretofore repealed.

Section 6) <u>Effective Date</u>. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and adoption.

MAY VALLEY WATER AUTHORITY ESTABLISHING CONTRACT

THIS MAY VALLEY WATER AUTHORITY ESTABLISHING CONTRACT ("Contract") is made and entered into, effective as of August 26, 2025 ("Establishment Date") by and between Bent County, Colorado ("Bent County"), and Prowers County, Colorado ("Prowers County"), each a duly and regularly created, organized and existing political subdivision and public body corporate and politic, existing as such under and by virtue of the Constitution and laws of the State of Colorado, individually referred to herein as a "Member" and collectively referred to herein as the "Members."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County are each duly and regularly created, organized and existing political subdivisions and public bodies corporate of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County are authorized by the provisions of Colo. Const. Art. XIV, §18, and C.R.S. 29-1-201, *et seq.*, to enter into contracts with other political subdivisions of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County are authorized by the provision of C.R.S. §29-1-204.2 to establish a water authority to be used to effect the development of water resources, systems and facilities, in whole or in part, for the benefit of the inhabitants and service users of the contracting parties or others at the discretion of the board of directors of the authority; and

WHEREAS, Bent County and Prowers County have determined it is in the best interests of their constituents and service users to establish a water authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing Recitals, which are incorporated by reference into this Contract, and in consideration of the mutual promises and undertakings herein, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1. NAME OF AUTHORITY

1.1. Name. The name of the entity hereby established shall be the May Valley Water Authority ("Authority").

ARTICLE 2. PURPOSE AND TERM OF AUTHORITY

- 2.1. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of the Authority is to effect the development of systems and facilities for purposes of furnishing a potable water supply for the benefit of the Members and their constituents and the Authority's service users. By this Contract, the Members intend to establish an entity for the purposes of financing, designing, constructing, acquiring, operating, maintaining, and utilizing water resources, facilities and services of such Authority in conjunction and cooperation with the Members.
- 2.2. <u>Term.</u> In accordance with C.R.S. §29-1-204.2(2)(d), this Contract shall continue until terminated pursuant to a written resolution and unanimous vote of the Board of Directors of the Authority in favor of termination and by ratification of such termination by the governing

bodies of each of the Members. However, this Contract may not be terminated so long as the Authority has bonds, notes or other obligations outstanding, unless provision for full payment of such obligations, by escrow or otherwise, has been made by the Board of Directors of the Authority pursuant to terms of such obligations at the time of termination.

2.3. <u>Termination</u>. In the event of the termination of this Contract and dissolution of the Authority, all rights, title and interest of the Authority in the General Assets (as hereinafter defined) of the Authority shall be conveyed to the May Valley Water Association, subject to any outstanding liens, mortgages or other pledges of such General Assets. The term "General Assets" as used herein shall include all legal and equitable interests in real or personal property, tangible or intangible, of the Authority.

ARTICLE 3. GOVERNING BODY

- 3.1 <u>Board of Directors.</u> The Board of Directors (the "Board" and the "Directors") shall consist of five (5) Directors initially appointed by the Bent County Board of County Commissioners (the "BOCC"). Any person appointed by the BOCC to serve as a Director on the Board must be a user of water services provided by the Authority, as evidenced by the ownership of a meter (each a "Water User"). Water Users wishing to be considered for appointment as a Director may apply to the BOCC or be recommended to the BOCC.
 - 3.1.1. The Directors appointed to the initial Board (the "Initial Board"), and the end of each Director's initial term shall be as set forth below:

- 3.1.2. <u>Term of Directors.</u> Except for the Initial Board, each Director shall serve a term of four years. However, the terms of the Initial Board shall be staggered so that the first term of each Director shall be as follows: the first two Directors appointed by the BOCC shall serve a two-year term and the next three Directors appointed by the BOCC shall serve four-year terms. Upon expiration of a term, a Director shall continue to serve until a successor Director has been appointed by the BOCC. Nothing herein shall preclude re-appointment of a Director by the BOCC for consecutive terms.
- 3.1.3. <u>Vacancy</u>. A vacancy occurring on the Board, for reasons other than expiration of the outgoing Director's term of office shall be filled by the selection of a successor Director by the current Directors, who shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term. The BOCC may remove a Director which it appointed with or without cause. At the expiration of any term of office for a Director(s), any vacant seat on the Board shall be appointed by the current

Directors, or if there are no current Directors, by the BOCC.

- 3.1.4. <u>Board Shall Conduct Business of the Authority.</u> The Governing Body of the Authority shall be the Board, in which all administrative and legislative power of the Authority is vested. The Board shall conduct the business of the Authority in good faith and utilizing a reasonable businessperson standard.
- 3.1.5. Expansion of Board of Directors. Upon the increase in Membership of the Authority as provided by Article 6, or upon Amendments to this Contract approved by the current Members as provided in Article 7, the number of Directors of the Authority's Board of Directors may be increased. However, no such Amendment shall result in the number of Directors being an even number.
- 3.2. <u>Meetings.</u> Regular meetings of the Board shall be held at such place, on such day, and at such hour as the Board shall, by resolution, from time to time establish. Special meetings may be held at any time and at any place within the State of Colorado provided at least twenty-four (24) hours' notice is provided to each Director. The President or Vice President may, and on the written request of two (2) Directors, shall, call a special meeting of the Board. Any director may include an item for discussion or action on the Board agenda, provided that such item or action is submitted for inclusion on the Board agenda at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the commencement of the meeting. The Authority is a political subdivision and public corporation of the State of Colorado, separate from the Members, within the meaning of the Colorado Open Meeting Law, C.R.S. §24-6-401, *et seq*.
- 3.2.1. <u>Quorum.</u> A quorum of the Board of Directors is more than one-half of the number of Directors serving on the Board. A quorum shall be necessary for any action to be taken by the Board.
- 3.2.2. <u>Voting</u>. Unless otherwise specifically provided for herein, a vote of a majority of the Directors in attendance at a meeting of the Authority shall be sufficient for action to be taken by the Board, provided a quorum is in attendance and available to vote on the action.
- 3.3. Officers and Duties. The Directors shall elect annually at the first meeting of each calendar year, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, provided however, that the Secretary may be a person other than a Director, and provided further that the same person may serve as both Secretary and Treasurer (provided that such Secretary/Treasurer is a Director). The President shall chair all meetings. Whenever the President is absent, the Vice-President shall assume all duties of the President. The Secretary shall keep in a visual text format that may be transmitted electronically, a record of all the Authority's proceedings, minutes of all meetings, certificates, contracts, bonds given by employees, and all corporate acts. The Treasurer shall keep strict and accurate accounts of all money received by or disbursed for and on behalf of the Authority in permanent records.

- 3.4. <u>Budgets. Accounting and Audits.</u> The Board shall comply with C.R.S. §29-1-204.2(2)(b)(IV) and all other applicable State and Federal laws and shall make provisions for annual budgets, and audits when required, in accordance with local government accounting standards including Parts 1, 5 and 6, Article 1, Title 29, C.R.S., as amended. Annual budgets and the results of any audits shall be presented to each Member no more than 30 days after review by the Board.
- 3.5. <u>Indemnification</u>. The Authority shall, to the extent permitted by law, indemnify and defend each Director, officer and employee of the Authority in connection with any claim or actual or threatened suit, action, or proceeding in which he or she may be involved in his or her official capacity by reason of his or her being or having been such Director or officer, or by reason or any action or omission by him or her in any such capacity. The Authority shall have no obligation to indemnify and defend any such Director or officer for any claim, suit, action or proceeding arising out of criminal offenses or willful and wanton misconduct of such Director or officer.

ARTICLE 4. POWERS OF THE AUTHORITY

- 4.1. The Authority shall have all general powers of an authority organized and operating pursuant to C.R.S. §29-1-204.2, which include the following:
- 4.1.1. To develop water resources, systems or facilities or conveyance and drainage facilities in connection to water treatment, in whole or in part for the benefit of the inhabitants or service users of the Members, at the discretion of the Board of Directors of the Authority, subject to fulfilling any conditions or requirements set forth in this Contract;
 - 4.1.2. To make and enter into contracts;
 - 4.1.3. To employ agents and employees;
- 4.1.4. To acquire, construct, manage, maintain, or operate water systems, facilities, works, or improvements, or drainage facilities, or any interest therein;
- 4.1.5. To acquire, hold, lease (as lessor or lessee), sell, or otherwise dispose of any real or personal property utilized for the purposes of water treatment, distribution, and wastewater disposal, or of conveyance and drainage;
- 4.1.6. To condemn property for use as rights-of-way only if such property is not owned by any public utility and devoted to such public use pursuant to state authority;
 - 4.1.7. To incur debts, liabilities, or obligations;
 - 4.1.8. To sue and be sued in its own name;
 - 4.1.9. To have and use a corporate seal;
- 4.1.10. To fix, maintain, and revise fees, rates, and charges for functions, services or facilities provided by the entity;

- 4.1.11. To adopt, by resolution, regulations respecting the exercise of its powers and the carrying out of its purpose;
- 4.1.12. To exercise any other powers which are essential to the provisions of functions, services, or facilities by the entity and which are specified in this contract;
- 4.1.13. To do and perform any acts and things authorized by this Contract, under, through, or by means of an agent or by contracts with any person, firm, or corporation;
- 4.1.14. To provide for the rehabilitation of any surfaces adversely affected by the construction of water pipelines, facilities, or systems or of drainage facilities through the rehabilitation of plant cover, soil stability, and other measures appropriate to the subsequent beneficial use of such lands;
- 4.1.15. To operate as an "Enterprise" under Colorado Constitution Article X, Section 20 if deemed desirable by the Board or if the Authority is determined to be a "District" under Colorado Constitution Article X, Section 20.
- 4.2. <u>Financial Powers.</u> The Authority is a political subdivision and a political corporation of the State of Colorado, separate from the Members. It shall have the duties, privileges, immunities, rights and liabilities of a public body politic and corporate. The provision of Articles 10.5 and 47 of Title 11, C.R.S., shall apply to moneys of the Authority.
- 4.2.1. The bonds, notes, and other obligations of the Authority shall not be the debts, liabilities, or obligations of the Members.
- 4.2.2. The Authority is authorized to receive funds from proprietary revenues for services rendered by the Authority, from proprietary revenues or other public funds as contributions to defray the cost of any purpose set forth in this Contract and from proprietary revenues or other public funds as advances for any purpose subject to repayment by the Authority.
- 4.2.3. To carry out the purposes for which the Authority is established, the Authority is authorized to issue bonds, notes, or other obligations payable solely from the revenues derived from the function, service, system or facility or the combined functions, services, systems, or facilities of the Authority or from any other available funds of the Authority. The terms, conditions, and details of said bonds, notes, and other obligations, the procedures related thereto, and the refunding thereof shall be set forth in the resolution authorizing said bonds, notes or other obligations.

ARTICLE 5. SERVICES OF THE AUTHORITY

- 5.1. <u>Standards of Service</u>. Any improvements operated by the Authority shall substantially comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes, regulations, ordinances, permits and orders, including without limitation, the Federal Clean Water Act and Safe Drinking Water Act. Where applicable, the Authority shall promulgate water quality standards, treatment standards and discharge standards for all Authority improvements.
- 5.2. Water Treatment for Customers. The Authority shall impose and collect reasonable operating rates and charges to recover the costs of operating, maintaining, repairing, replacing, and as necessary, expanding infrastructure and improvements and paying debt service on its bonds, loans or other obligations. Such rates and charges shall be established by the Board and modified as necessary. Rates and charges may include reasonable allocations of general and administrative overhead expenses. The Board may establish different rates and charges for different categories of Water Users and for providing water directly to the Members.

ARTICLE 6. TRANSFER OF ASSETS AND ASSUMPTION OF OBLIGATIONS AND LIABILITIES; ASSIGNMENT AND ADDITION OF MEMBER ENTITIES

- 6.1. <u>Transfer of Assets and Assumption of Obligations and Liabilities.</u> Some or all assets of the existing May Valley Water Association (other than the water rights currently owned by the May Valley Water Association which may or may not be transferred at the discretion of the May Valley Water Association and the Board) may be transferred to the Authority upon execution of this Agreement and from time to time thereafter. The Authority shall assume all obligations and liabilities of the May Valley Water Association under existing contracts and to which the May Valley Water Association is a party.
- 6.2. Assignment of Membership. Each Member shall be entitled to assign their interest in this Contract to another political subdivision of the State of Colorado authorized to own and operate water systems or facilities, which entity is not already a Member to this Contract. Any such assignment must be approved by the Board prior to transfer of interest, including any terms and conditions the Board finds necessary and proper. No partial assignment shall be recognized. In event of an assignment of Membership, the governing body of the new Member shall ratify the then current terms of this Contract and cause an addendum to this Contract to be executed.

- 6.3. <u>Additional Members.</u> Additional political subdivisions of the State of Colorado authorized to own and operate water systems or facilities may become Members upon unanimous approval by the Board. In the event a new Member is approved by the Board, this Contract shall be amended to acknowledge the new Member and make additional changes as may be needed. Any such amendment must be ratified by the governing body of each Member.
- 6.4. <u>Deletion of Member.</u> Until there are more than two parties to this contract, the provisions for termination of the Authority shall govern the deletion of a party from this Contract. If an additional Member is added, the amendment to this Contract adding the new Member shall determine the procedure for deleting a Member.

ARTICLE 7. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 7.1. <u>Amendment.</u> No amendment to this Contract, including an amendment adding parties to the Contract in the future, shall be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the Authority and each Member. An amendment to add a Member to this Contract shall specify the conditions and requirements to be fulfilled by the new Member.
- 7.2. <u>Partial Invalidity</u>. If any portion of this Contract is determined by a court having jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remaining portions of this Contract, the intention being that the various provisions of this Contract are severable.
- 7.3. <u>Governing Law.</u> This Contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Colorado without regard to choice of law analysis and applicable federal law.
- 7.4. <u>Fiscal Year.</u> The fiscal year of the Authority shall begin on the first day of January in each year.
- 7.5. <u>Authority.</u> Each party hereto represents and warrants that it has all requisite power, corporate or otherwise, to execute, deliver and perform their obligations pursuant to this Contract. Each party hereto represents and warrants to the other that the execution, delivery and performance of this Contract has been duly authorized by it, and that upon execution and delivery, this Contract will constitute a legal, valid and binding obligation, enforceable against it in accordance with the terms of this Contract.
- 7.6. <u>Notices.</u> If under the terms of this Contract, or as needed in the regular business of the Authority, notice is to be provided to any Member, said notice shall be deemed provided upon personal delivery or after providing electronic notice of the same. The names or address to whom notice is to be sent may be modified by the affected Member by a written notice in writing to the Authority. Until so modified, the persons to receive notice are as follows:

Nothing herein shall be construed to create a contractual relationship with, cause of action in favor of, or claim for relief for, any third party, including any agent or contractor of the Authority. No third-party beneficiaries are intended by this Contract. Any third-party receiving a benefit from this Agreement is an incidental and unintended beneficiary only.
- 7.8. Entire Agreement. This Contract constitutes the entire agreement among the parties pertaining to the subject matter of this Contract and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings of the parties as to the subject matter of this Contract. No representation, warranty, covenant, agreement or condition not expressed in this Contract shall be binding upon the parties or shall change or restrict the provisions of this Contract.
- 7.9. <u>Governmental Immunity</u> Nothing in this Contract shall be construed as a waiver of the rights and privileges of the Members pursuant to the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. §24-10-101, *et seq*.

7.10. <u>Counterparts.</u> This Contract may be executed in one or more counterparts, all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING AGREEMENT

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is executed between Prowers County's Prowers Area Transit (PATS), a department within Prowers County, and Alta Vista Charter School (School) for transportation services for the School's parents who register their children for this service during the 2025-2026 school year.

- 1. <u>Ridership service provided</u> PATS will provide pickup and delivery of the School's students who are signed up for ridership. Pickup of the students will be during the school week at approximately 4:15 p.m. at the designated bus stop (DeWitt's Excavating Parking lot). The students will be delivered to an address as provided to PATS by the School for each individual student. Delivery shall be no later than 5:15 p.m.
- 2. <u>Minimum Ridership Required</u> There shall be a minimum of 11 paid School students per month committed to PATS ridership for the 2025 2026 School year. Should the School fail to meet this minimum ridership commitment, this MOU will be deemed null and void.
- 3. Signing up the students for PATS Ridership The School shall be responsible for the signing up of its students for PATS ridership for the 2025-2026 School year and providing these registrations to the PATS Director, prior to the first day of the 2025-2026 School year. Said registration form will be provided to the School prior to their registration date.
- 4. <u>Collection of Ridership Fees</u> The School shall be responsible for collecting all PATS ridership fees for its registered students who ride the PATS bus during the 2025-2026 school year. The fees will be delivered or mailed to the PATS office, 200 East Hickory Street, Lamar, Colorado 81052 on a monthly basis. *The agreed fees schedule is attached*.
- 5. <u>Deficiency in Operation Costs vs Revenue</u> In the event that the PATS Operation costs for providing ridership services to the School's students for the 2025-2026 school year exceed the revenue derived from the ridership fees (based on the minimum number of riders required), PATS will provide an itemized statement to the School no later than June 1, 2026. The School shall pay the deficit amount to PATS no later than July 1, 2026. Checks will be made payable to Prowers Area Transit.
- Termination of Agreement Either party may terminate this MOU Agreement for any reason upon a 30-day written notice to the other party. If to PATS: Director, 200 East Hickory Street, Lamar, Colorado 81052. If to the School: Talara Coen, Alta Vista Charter School, 8785 CR LL, Lamar, Colorado 81052.
- 7. SATUTORY COUNTY Prowers County, Colorado, which is a statutory county in the State of Colorado, reserves all rights as a statutory entity, including governmental immunity as provided by law.
- 8. ASSIGNMENT School may not assign this contract without the written consent of Prowers County.



- 9. VENUE Jurisdiction for any dispute under this agreement shall be exclusively in the Prowers County, Colorado District or County Court sitting without jury in Lamar, Colorado, and the court shall award to Prowers County, if it is the substantially prevailing party, its attorney fees, expert witness fees, court costs and any other litigation expense.
- 10. APPROPRIATION Any monetary obligation to Prowers County payable after the current fiscal year is subject to appropriation as provided by law.
- 11. PUBLIC RECORD In the event Prowers County receives a public record demand pursuant to the Colorado Open Records Act for copies of documents which the agreement provides are confidential, or may otherwise be subject to non-disclosure, Prowers County shall give written notice by email to School. School shall notify Prowers County in writing by facsimile and/or email within 3 working days of notification if any documents requested as a public record should not be disclosed. The School shall indemnify and hold harmless Prowers County as provided in Paragraph 6 for any public record requests where the School requests Prowers County not to disclose such records.
- 12. INDEMNIFICATION School shall indemnify, save, and hold harmless Prowers County against any and all claims, damages, liability, and court awards including costs, expenses, and attorney fees incurred as a result of any act or omission by the School, or its employees, agents, officers and representatives.
- 13. DEFAULT In the event of a default, the defaulting party shall have fifteen (15) days after receipt of written notice of default to cure such default or provide sufficient proof that demonstrates that measures to correct default are diligently being taken.
- 14. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR The School shall perform its duties hereunder as an independent contractor and shall be solely responsible for the acts of the School, its employees, and agents. Neither the School nor any agent or employee of the School shall be or shall be deemed to be an agent or employee of Prowers County. The School shall pay when due all required employment, income, and other taxes on any monies paid by Prowers County pursuant to this contract. The School acknowledges that the School and its employees are not entitled to unemployment insurance benefits unless the School or a third party provides such coverage and that Prowers County does not pay for or otherwise provide such coverage. The School shall have no authorization, express or implied, to bind Prowers County to any agreements, liabilities, or understandings except as expressly set forth herein. The School shall provide and keep in force worker's compensation and unemployment compensation insurance in the amounts required by law and provides proof of such insurance when requested by Prowers County.
- 15. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT No official or employee of Prowers County shall directly or indirectly receive or be paid any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit that may arise therefore in violation of Article 29 of the Colorado Constitution. School warrants that it has not retained any

School or person (other than a bona fide employee working solely for School) to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that School has not paid or agreed to pay to any School or person, (other than a bona fide employee working for School), any fee, commission, percentage brokerage fee, gift or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award of this Agreement to School. Upon Discovery of any breach or violation of this provision, Prowers County shall have the right to terminate this Agreement.

- 16. BINDING EFFECT This Agreement is binding upon the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns. In the event of any conflict with the provisions of the main agreement, the provisions of the Addendum will control.
- 17. PATS reserves the right to refuse service for disruptive behavior, after giving notice to the PATS Director and to School.

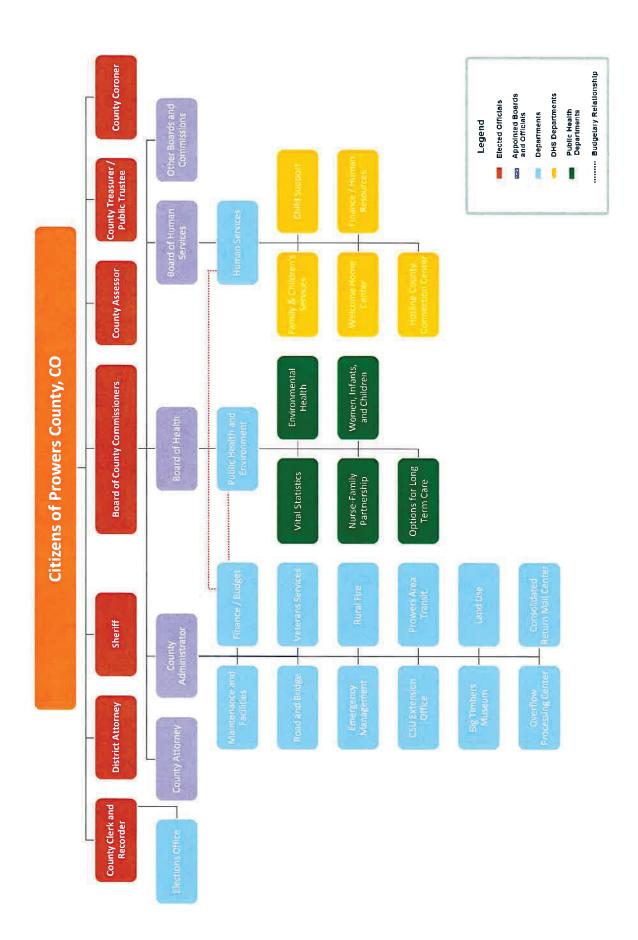

Reading the Cost Allocation Plan

Overview

The 2 CFR Part 200 Cost Allocation Plan is a document that distributes, or allocates, County indirect costs. Indirect costs are those costs incurred by County divisions and departments that benefit other County divisions and departments. Examples of indirect costs are accounting, purchasing, human resources and information technology. The primary purpose for preparing the Cost Allocation Plan is to (1) identify the appropriate division and department indirect costs and (2) calculate corresponding indirect cost rates.

Single Occupant Buildings. Costs associated with building maintenance for single occupant buildings are allocated based on actual costs by fund/dept.

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this <u>12</u> day of <u>like</u> 2024 by and between **Prowers** County, Colorado, c/o Prowers County Public Health and Environment, and Kiowa County, Colorado, c/o Kiowa County Public Health (KCPH), by and through its Board of Health (BOH).

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment and the State Board of Health require local public health agencies to provide certain public health services to their citizens; said services may include but are not limited to:

- *Food safety and sanitation programs
- *Water quality programs
- *Zoonosis programs
- *Housing and institutional sanitation, safety monitoring, and protection
- *Environmental compliance and community safety
- *Recreation sanitation and safety programs
- *Air quality monitoring and protection; and

WHEREAS, KCPH is interested in contracting with a qualified provider to deliver these public health services to the residents of Kiowa County; and

WHEREAS, PCPHE desires to provide those services to the residents of Kiowa County,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and mutual covenants contained herein, the parties hereto covenant and agree as follows:

1. TERM

This Agreement shall be in effect for the period January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

2. RESPONSIBILITIES

PCPHE shall perform the required activities as outlined in the Environmental Health Services Scope of Work, included as *Exhibit 1*.

KCPH shall work collaboratively with PCPHE to ensure completion of all of the required deliverables within each scope of work.

3. COMPENSATION AND PAYMENT – ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

- a. PCPHE shall bill KCPH a flat fee of \$1,848 for CY 2025 for approximately 22 hours of service for any environmental health services rendered to Kiowa County or its citizens. The hourly rate for the initial term of this agreement shall be \$84.00 per hour, regardless of which PCPHE employee performed the services, at an annual rate not to exceed \$1,848. No additional indirect rate shall be charged by PCPHE for environmental health services. All revenues received from state or federal sources for provision of these services, and any fees collected in performance of them, unless passed through to any other agency as required by state or federal law, or CDPHE rules and regulations, shall be retained by PCPHE. Such fees shall be established by the Kiowa County Board of Health, in accordance with state or federal law, or CDPHE rules and regulations.
- b. PCPHE staff will document hours and activities spent on environmental health services for Kiowa County; these hours and activities will be documented and submitted to the KCPH semiannually and an annual summary will also be provided.
- c. PCPHE shall submit an invoice to KCPH by February 15, 2025 in the amount of \$1848.
- d. KCPH shall submit payment to PCPHE within thirty (30) days after receipt of the invoice.

4. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS, PAYMENT OF TAXES AND INSURANCE COVERAGE

- a. In performing services under this Agreement PCPHE is acting as an independent contractor and not as an agent or employee of KCPH.
- b. As an independent contractor, PCPHE is solely liable and responsible for maintaining workers' compensation insurance which complies with statutory requirements in the State of Colorado, unemployment insurance benefits, and the withholding and payment of any and all federal, state and local taxes applicable to the receipt of funds or other consideration by KCPH under the terms of this Agreement.

INSURANCE

In performing services under this Agreement, PCPHE shall maintain professional liability insurance and workers' compensation insurance coverage provided by an insurance carrier licensed to do business in the State of Colorado. PCPHE shall maintain liability coverage on all PCPHE motor vehicles used in the performance of this Agreement, in amounts required by Colorado law. Appropriate certificates evidencing all such coverages shall be provided to KCPH upon request.

6. NON-ASSIGNMENT

Neither this Agreement nor any interest therein, nor any claim thereunder, shall be assigned by PCPHE to any third person without the prior written consent of KCPH.

7. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT

No elected or employed member of either party to this Agreement shall directly or indirectly receive or be paid any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit that may arise therefore. PCPHE warrants that it has not retained any company or person (other than a bona fide employee working solely for PCPHE) to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that PCPHE has not paid or agreed to pay to any company or person, (other than a bona fide employee working for PCPHE), any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award of this Agreement to PCPHE. Upon learning of any breach or violation of this provision, KCPH shall have the right to terminate this Agreement.

8. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

PCPHE shall not refuse to hire, discharge, promote, demote or discriminate in matters of compensation against any person otherwise qualified, solely because of race, creed, sex, color, national origin or ancestry, disability or age.

9. ILLEGAL ALIENS

PCPHE certifies that PCPHE shall comply with the provisions of CRS 8-17.5-101 et seq. PCPHE shall not knowingly employ or contract with an illegal alien to perform work under this contract or enter into a contract with a subcontractor that fails to certify to PCPHE that the subcontractor shall not knowingly employ or contract with an illegal alien to perform work under this contract. PCPHE represents, warrants, and agrees that it (i) has verified that it does not employ any illegal aliens, through participation in the Basic Pilot Employment Verification Program administered by the Social Security Administration and Department of Homeland Security, and (ii) otherwise will comply with the requirements of CRS 8-17.5-102(2)(b). PCPHE shall comply with all reasonable requests made in the course of an investigation under CRS 8-17.5-102 by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment. If PCPHE fails to comply with any requirement of this provision or CRS 8-17.5-101 et seq., KCPH may terminate this contract for breach and PCPHE shall be liable for actual and consequential damages to KCPH.

10. STATUTES, REGULATIONS AND ORDINANCES

PCPHE shall observe and comply with federal, state and local laws, regulations, rules or ordinances that affect those employed or engaged by it, the materials or equipment used or the performance of the project and shall procure any and all necessary approvals, licenses and permits all at its own expense.

11. NON-APPROPRIATION

Payment of KCPH's obligations hereunder in the fiscal years subsequent to the Agreement period is contingent upon funds for this Agreement being appropriated and budgeted. If funds for this Agreement are not appropriated and budgeted in any year subsequent to the fiscal year of the execution of this Agreement, this Agreement shall terminate. KCPH's fiscal year is the calendar year.

12. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or in any circumstance shall be unenforceable to any extent, the remainder of this Agreement and the application of such provision to other persons or in other circumstances shall not be affected thereby and shall be enforced to the greatest extent permitted by law.

13. TERMINATION

PCPHE or KCPH may terminate this Agreement by giving 30-day notice, in writing, to the other party.

14. NOTICES

EXHIBIT 1 ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES SCOPE OF WORK

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

PCPHE shall provide the Environmental Health Service Programs listed in Table 1 to Kiowa County during the period beginning January 1, 2025 and ending December 31, 2025.

Upon request from Kiowa County, PCPHE shall provide any or all of the additional Environmental Health Services listed in Table 2.

All Environmental Health services provided by PCPHE shall be conducted in accordance with the applicable and appropriate federal, state, and local rules and regulations.

SPECIFICATIONS

- 1. PCPHE shall provide the service programs listed in Table 1.
- 2. PCPHE staff shall determine compliance with all applicable rules and regulations as required by law while conducting Environmental Health services for Kiowa County.
- 3. PCPHE shall use legally defensible state approved (or equivalent) inspection, investigation, and reporting forms as needed.
- 4. PCPHE shall provide semi-annual progress reports.

RECORDS AND RECORD MANAGEMENT

Kiowa County will collaborate with PCPHE to provide appropriate historical records and define record keeping needs. Forms identified in state regulations shall be used and/or others agreed upon by both Kiowa County and PCPHE. PCPHE will collaborate with Kiowa County to complete reports required by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. PCPHE shall maintain all records and documents pertaining to the services provided under this Agreement for a period of 3-years or as required by state or Federal law and/or provide the records to Kiowa County for archiving. Upon the request of Kiowa County, PCPHE shall provide Kiowa County with copies of any and all records and documents pertaining to the services provided under this contract in an electronic and/or hard copy format approved by Kiowa County. Prior to the disposal of any records PCPHE has in its possession, PCPHE shall provide Kiowa County with a thirty (30) day written notice during which time Kiowa County may take physical possession of same at the storage site.

ENFORCEMENT

PCPHE shall provide Kiowa County with a list of specific violations observed while conducting Environmental Health program services. Enforcement actions to correct those violations shall be at the discretion of Kiowa County.

WORK PRODUCTS

Any and all maps, reports, spreadsheets, databases, geographical information system (GIS) files, newsletters and other hard copy or electronic documents generated by the service provider in fulfillment of its obligations under this contract shall be the property of Kiowa County, who shall

Prowers County is pleased to offer this letter in support of Southeast Colorado Enterprise Development's (SECED) effort to have a re-designation of its dual status as an Enterprise Zone and an Enhanced Rural EZ. The six southeast Colorado counties represented by SECED have had the benefit of EZ status since 1989.

To date, 15 projects in our county have been certified as EZ Contribution Projects, allowing them to secure investments and meet key goals. These include small business expansions, facility upgrades, and community improvement efforts. Without the EZ designation, many of these projects would have faced significant financial obstacles or may not have happened at all.

As of 2024, the six-county area (Region 6) supported by SECED has seen:

- \$95,583,344 in local capital investment,

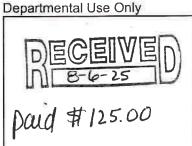

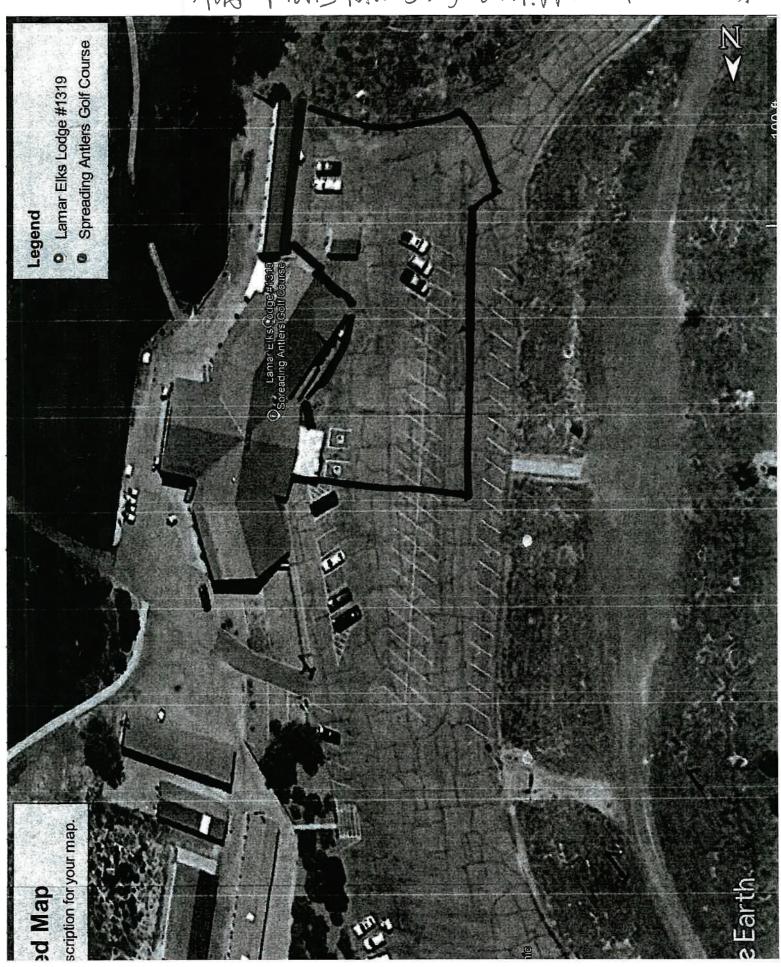

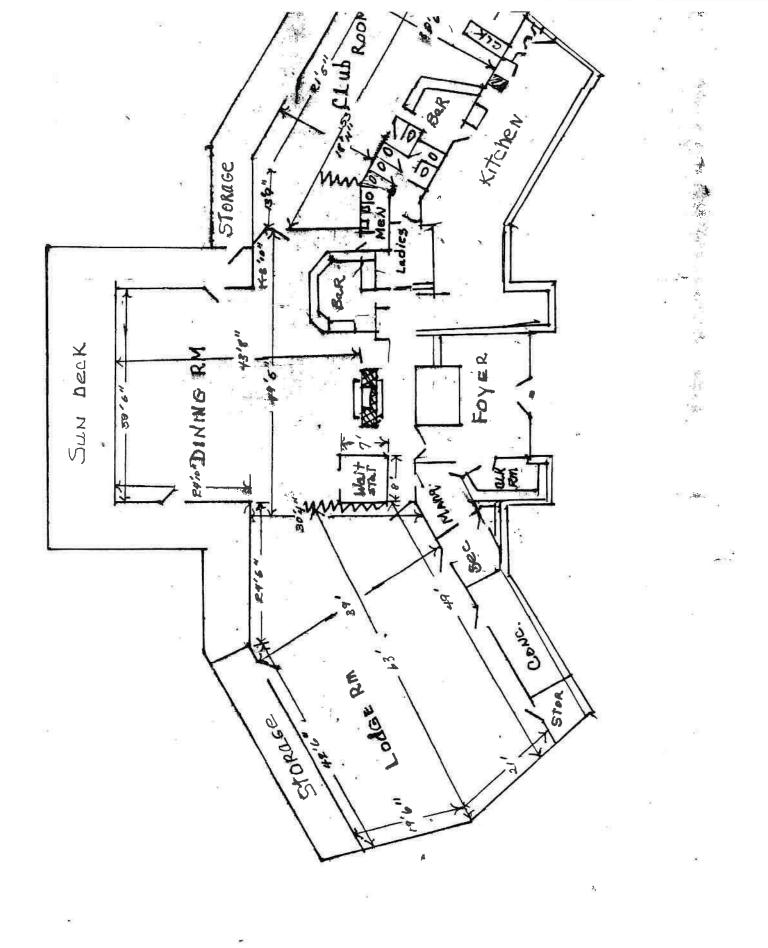

Inter-Agency Partnership Memorandum of Understanding

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is made this **10.1.2025** between:

Kit Carson County Department of Public Health and Environment

WIC Department 252 S 14th Street Burlington, CO 80807

AND

Prowers County Public Health WIC Department 1001 S. Main Street Lamar, CO 81052

This MOU delineates the terms, conditions, and responsibilities for activities related to implementing the required service standards for the Colorado WIC Program (COWIC) at the Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment (CDPHE).

A. Purpose

This MOU establishes a framework for collaboration and partnership between Agencies that hold separate COWIC contracts, Kit Carson County Department of Public Health and Environment WIC Department, and Prowers County Public Health and Environment (PCPHE) WIC Program, hereinafter the Parties, in providing a Regional WIC Director /High-Risk Counselor, breastfeeding coordinator, and back-up support to standard WIC procedures.

The Parties agree that the actions/services supported by the proposed Partnership will improve:

- COWIC client experience and customer service/access to services.
- Expansion of existing or new inter-agency collaboration.
- Strategic use of funding to maximize the impact and efficiency of resources/operations.
- Agency infrastructure to drive COWIC leadership and partnership potential.

The objective is to implement a work plan that shares support and expertise to ensure continuous access to and high-quality services for COWIC participants in both regions, which is mutually beneficial to the Parties. The Parties may collectively hold one or more COWIC contracts to receive annual funding.

B. Scope of Work

The Parties agree to adhere to the duties and responsibilities outlined in the attached Addendum specific to their respective roles.

C. Supervision of WIC Staff

- 1. [Kit Carson County DPHE/WIC Department] agrees to provide supervision and oversight for Prowers County WIC Program. WIC staff are specific to Program-related duties and tasks only. According to the Local Staffing policy. (Attachment)
- 2. **Prowers County** agrees to cooperate with Kit **Carson County DPHE** in facilitating access to its WIC staff members and providing necessary support and resources to ensure the success of collaborative initiatives.
- 3. The Parties will work collaboratively to define the WIC staff's roles, responsibilities, and expectations.
- 4. **Kit Carson County DPHE** will ensure that all Program staff in both agencies adhere to relevant policies, procedures, and service standards outlined in the COWIC contract.
- 5. **Kit Carson County DPHE** agrees to complete chart reviews annually for the Program staff person(s) and at least one observation for performance review purposes.
- 6. **Kit Carson County DPHE** pledges to provide a written summary of the job performance of WIC staff members to **Prowers County** leadership before the staff member's annual review, ensuring a comprehensive evaluation process.
- 7. **Prowers County** will assume responsibility for supervising their employees as the WIC staff person(s), ensuring the integration of the WIC job performance summary into the annual review process, and following through with the yearly review.
- 8. **Prowers County** will collaborate with the **Kit Carson County DPHE** WIC Director to establish and implement performance corrective action steps as necessary.
- Prowers County will accept and allow the Kit Carson County DPHE WIC Director to offer guidance, support, and feedback to the Prowers County WIC staff person(s) for the Program-specific aspects of their WIC tasks.
- 10. **Prowers County** will ensure the implementation of any necessary job improvements and will ultimately be held responsible for the level and quality of program service provided by their agency.
- 11. **Prowers County** collaborates with Kit Carson County DPHE counterparts to synchronize supervision strategies, fostering alignment with COWIC service standards and policies. This Partnership entails ongoing communication and leadership engagement between the agencies.
- 12. Unless otherwise noted in this Agreement, both parties shall be responsible for their referral management and all other Program service standards.

D. Termination and Amendments

This MOU will take effect upon the signature of authorized signatories for each of The Parties.

Either Party may terminate this MOU with or without cause with thirty (30) days' advance written notice to the other Party unless there is a failure to perform the duties and responsibilities by either party in Section B. Termination for any reason shall be communicated in writing to COWIC at CDPHE within thirty (30) days.

The Parties acknowledge and consent that the terms of this MOU are contingent upon the annual allocation of funds by CDPHE. In the event of insufficient funding, the Agreement may be terminated without any liability to any parties involved.

E. Indemnification / Compliance with Law:

- a. During the term of this MOU, the Parties agree to comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.
- b. Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, no term or condition of this MOU shall be construed or interpreted as a waiver, express or implied, of any of the immunities, rights, benefits, protection, or other provisions of the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. § 24-10-101, et seq., as now or hereafter amended. The Parties understand and agree that liability for claims for injuries to persons or property arising out of the negligence of either Party, its departments, institutions, agencies, boards, officials, and employees is controlled and limited by the provisions of C.R.S. § 24-10-101, et seq., and the risk management statutes, C.R.S. §24-30-1501, et seq., as now or hereafter amended.

F. Confidentiality of COWIC Information:

The Parties agree to comply with all Program data use policies and procedures defined in the COWIC Program Policies & Procedures manual.

G. Other:

- a. This MOU constitutes the entire agreement between The Parties and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements, representations, and understandings between The Parties. No variation or modification of this MOU and no waiver of any of the MOU's provisions or conditions shall be binding unless made in writing and signed by duly authorized owners, principals, or officers of the Parties.
- b. This MOU shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties and their respective heirs, representatives, successors, and assigns. Any delegation or assignment of this MOU by either party without the prior written consent of the other party shall be void. This MOU shall be governed by and construed according to the laws of the State of Colorado.
- c. The subject headings of this MOU's paragraphs are included for convenience only and shall not affect the construction or interpretation of its provisions.

Section 1 - Roles of the Regional WIC Local Agency Director

The Regional Local Agency WIC Director provides Director-level qualifications and duties for more than one COWIC Agency. The Director fulfills the duties as described in the <u>Local Staffing</u> policy. Duties covered by the partnering Agency(ies) will be listed separately under Section 2.

Communication Methods:

- Phone and Email: preferred and primary method of communication for regular correspondence between WIC staff.
- Tele-conference (Zoom, Teams, Google Meet): These options will be utilized for meetings or discussions requiring visual or interactive elements.
- In-person: While limited, face-to-face meetings will be planned as needed.

On Going Duties:

Communication

- Communicate with the local Public Health Director and/or assigned designee of the partnering agency(ies).
- Collaboration with the local agency leadership and WIC staff.

Providing Oversight, Direction, and Support Systems for the following:

- Pump Loan Program
- BFPC Program.
- LARC duties (local agency will continue to complete the retail monitoring visits).
- Maintenance or replacement of equipment (annual scale calibration will continue to be paid for by the appropriate Agency).
- WIC Referral System.
- Administrative sections in Compass (i.e., Scheduler, Staff Training documentation, outreach and referral resources, local pamphlets, master schedule, etc.) and updates as needed.

Coordinating the following:

- WIC staff meetings and in-services; minimum quarterly meetings.
- State office monitoring visits.

Managing the following:

- Monitoring caseload and staffing ratios
- Work with agencies on outreach and partnerships; conduct outreach activities and maintain a current referral list.
- New Employee Training.
- Ongoing employee performance (documented observations and record reviews) and training.
- Staff policy/procedure updates.
- State-wide Support as needed.
- Nutrition Education Plan.
- Speciality formula ordering.

Ensuring the following:

- Medicaid and substance abuse programs are provided as required referrals.
- Timely follow-up on State-identified Separation of Duties/Program Integrity reports.
- Participant feedback is addressed in a timely and appropriate manner.
- Communicate state office policy and procedure changes/updates to all WIC employees.
- Attendance at CLWDA Calls, COWIC Check-in, and other pertinent State Office Calls/Training.
- Performance concerns with staff are documented and communicated with the partnering local agency, as agreed upon.
- Equipment inspection and calibration is completed.
- Time study submission.

Daily Duties:

- Communicate with staff as needed.
- Counsel high-risk participants as needed.
- Cover or arrange coverage or rescheduling for absences to maintain client services.

Weekly Duties:

- Oversee clinic schedules (work with the agency on scheduling), including downtime/white space duties.
- Attend COWIC Check-in Calls (every other week or as scheduled) and share relevant information with staff.
- Attend CLWDA Calls (every other week or as scheduled).

Monthly

- Order special formula from Ward Road (coordinate with local agency and State office).
- Run/evaluate/follow up on the WIC reports.

Annually

 Completion and submission of annual local agency Nutrition Education Plan and Evaluation.

- Ensure two nutrition education related trainings per year for all WIC staff.
- Ensure annual WIC Civil Rights Training for all WIC staff.
- Provide feedback for the local agency for employee evaluations as arranged. Nonperformance of WIC duties or issues of noncompliance with WIC policies and procedures will be reported to State designee and Local Agency designee.

Section 2 - Roles of the Partnering Agency or Agencies

Local Agency WIC Director

Local Agency (LA) WIC Director performs professional administrative and supervisory work in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of the WIC Program. Oversees and coordinates the WIC activities of all clinic sites to ensure compliance with federal and state regulations. In large agencies, many of the duties described in this role may be delegated to other staff members. However, the ultimate responsibility for each duty falls on the WIC Director. In small agencies, the WIC Director and the WIC High Risk Counselor may be the same individual. The LA WIC Director works under the supervision of the agency's health officer or a designated high level administrator. The LA WIC Director has line authority over subordinate professional and paraprofessional staff involved in the WIC Program.

Qualifications

- Registration/License: The WIC Director must be a Registered Dietitian (RD) with the Commission on Dietetic Registration, a Registered Nurse (BSN or RN) licensed to practice in the State of Colorado, or a Medical Doctor (MD). Because WIC is a nutrition program, the position of WIC Director is ideally held by a Registered Dietitian.
- Education: Minimum requirements include Bachelor of Science degree from an accredited university with major studies in foods and human nutrition or nursing. Preference is given to those who have a Master of Science (MS) or Master of Public Health (MPH) degree.
- Experience: Experience in public health or ambulatory care settings is preferred. A minimum of one-year experience in a public health setting or one year in a hospital setting is acceptable for consideration.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

A fully functioning WIC Director should possess the knowledge, skills, and abilities listed below. In hiring for this position, supervisors should look for persons who possess most of these skills:



Section 4: Organization and Management

- Knowledge of human nutrition in health and nutrition needs for disease and its application to public health practices. Knowledge of nutrition needs for infants, children and women during the prenatal, postpartum, and breastfeeding stages.
- Knowledge of training, supervision, counseling, and educational concepts and methods.
- Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.
- Ability to manage Program operations and carry out Program planning functions; ability to formulate plans, policies, and procedures.
- Ability to organize, prepare, and analyze reports.
- Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.
- Ability to promote breastfeeding as the optimal infant feeding choice while allowing participant choice.
- Ability to supervise and direct professional and paraprofessional staff.
- Ability to develop forms and educational materials.

Responsibilities/Duties

Manages overall WIC clinic operations:

- Formulates plans (including nutrition education plans), policies, standards, and procedures for the operation of the agency WIC Program within state and federal guidelines.
- Understands state and federal rules and regulations and follows up on agency deficiencies.
- · Interprets and makes arrangements for implementation of federal and state regulations and policies.
- Evaluates implementation of new policies.
- · Manages caseload and spending levels to meet appropriations by the State Office.
- Develops and makes recommendations for WIC budget proposals. Contacts State WIC fiscal officer and/or nutrition consultant regarding fiscal concerns/issues.
- Oversees, coordinates, and manages prescreening and waiting lists.
- Completes all forms/reports as requested by State WIC staff for monitoring and site visits; attends
 monitoring and site visit sessions; follows up on all monitoring findings and submits a timely response to the
 State Office.
- Ensures required retail monitoring and vendor training is done and that retailer monitoring reports are completed; works with retailers to prevent or correct problems. Ensures retailer contacts are documented in retailer files, and retailer misuse is documented in participant electronic charts. Ensures the State Retailer Coordinator is contacted with vendor problems/issues.
- Evaluates services to participants including clinic flow, use of staff time, clinic access, phone coverage, clinic space, and community needs.
- Provides the State Office with immediate feedback on adverse consequences of State policies or if policies are not understood.
- Ensures consistency among clinics in technical procedures and use of forms. Makes regular visits to all decentralized clinics to oversee operations.
- · Oversees maintenance of equipment and testing for accuracy at all clinic sites.
- Maintains participant confidentiality and ensures that participants are treated equally and with respect, compassion, and empathy.
- Informs the State Office of major changes (i.e., staff, address, telephone, clinic hours which affect services).
- Participates in continuing education activities; attends meetings, conferences, and workshops; keeps abreast of current nutrition research as it relates to the WIC Program and participants. Registered dietitians must maintain registration with the required 75 credit hours per five-year period.
- Runs appropriate reports to verify food benefit issuance and redemption, processing standards, caseload management, etc.
- Contacts nutrition consultant with questions concerning caseload, management reports, clinic flow, State policies, equipment needs, nutrition education, staffing, and monitoring visits.
- Maintains a basic working knowledge regarding the Compass computer system and how it operates.
- Complies with the state WIC office regarding security, operations and functions of the Compass system.
- Ensures that administration areas of Compass are updated; referrals, pamphlets, Master Schedule, etc.
- Acts as LA Breastfeeding Coordinator (unless other staff is appointed).
- Completes the WIC Lactation Specialist (WLS) training when offered next.
- Oversees breast pump loan program.
- Oversees Breastfeeding Peer Counseling (BFPC) Program (if applicable).
- Ensures staff is well trained.



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- Recruits, interviews, and recommends individuals for hire.
- o Oversees or conducts the orientation, training, and evaluation of newly hired WIC personnel.
 - ✓ Ensures new staff complete Level I, II and III of the WIC Certification Program as outlined by the state office.
 - Observes staff interaction during appointments, including performing thorough nutrition assessments and providing nutrition information and counseling participants.
- Defines staff roles and responsibilities, evaluates participant/staff ratios and staff needs.
- Supervises WIC staff including annual performance evaluations, ongoing coaching and feedback.
- o Ensures continuing education opportunities for staff, including at least two sessions per year devoted to nutrition education.
- Holds regular staff meetings to provide and enhance communication, to provide updates on policy and procedures, and provide staff training. Monthly staff meetings are optimal; however, small agencies may need bi-monthly or quarterly meetings.
- o Ensures quality nutrition education services to participants.
- Develops or adapts and implements protocols of nutrition care.
- o Ensures staff members are trained in protocols.
- o Ensures that a WIC High Risk Counselor is available and trained to provide high risk education contacts.
- Defines high risk for the agency (ensuring the State defined minimum definitions of high risk are covered); ensures WIC Educators know how to make appropriate referrals of high risk participants to the WIC High Risk Counselor.
- Observes counseling skills of all staff members to ensure that accurate and appropriate information is being disseminated and that counseling skills are adequate. Trains staff in areas where improvement is needed.
- Ensures that the documentation in participant electronic chart meets the required criteria listed in the WIC Program Manual.
- Reviews, selects, or develops nutrition education materials as needed.
- Attends and ensures that all staff members attend State sponsored WIC training. Attends and ensures
 that all staff members attend required State sponsored WIC trainings.
- Recommends and registers staff for the WLS training (including suggesting staff take training as a refresher if staff completed the WLS training more than 5 years prior).
- Oversees the implementation of Program nutrition objectives, participates in the nutrition education planning process via State Office guidance, and ensures that nutrition education and data collection conforms to standardized and accepted practices.
- Coordinates activities with other community services.
 - Arranges outreach and publicity for the agency WIC Program.
 - o Develops formal referral relationships with pediatric and obstetric health caregivers.
 - Acts as a liaison to the community regarding WIC services, policies, and/or nutrition issues (e.g., informing and updating health care providers, social service agencies, assessing community needs).
 - Coordinates and assists staff to be familiar with community resources and services when referring WIC participants.

Regional WIC Local Agency Director

Regional WIC Local Agency Director (RWLAD) performs professional administrative and supervisory work in the planning, development, implementation and elevation of the WIC program. Oversees and coordinates the WIC activities of multiple agencies/counties and clinic "satellite" sites to ensure compliance with federal and state regulations. The RWLAD may delegate some of the duties described in this role; however, the ultimate responsibility for each duty and all contract requirements falls on the RWLAD. The RWLAD works under supervision of the agency's health officer or a designated high-level administrator and has line authority over subordinate professional and paraprofessional staff involved in the WIC program at all sites in the region. Roles related to the human resource management of staff at satellite agencies may remain a responsibility of that agency, depending on the structure and agreement between agencies and approved by the state authority

Qualifications

• Registration/License: The Regional WIC Director must be a Registered Dietitian (RD) with the Commission on Dietetic Registration, a Registered Nurse (BSN or RN) licensed to practice in the State of Colorado, or a Medical Doctor (MD). Because WIC is a nutrition program, the position of WIC Director is ideally held by a Registered Dietitian.



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- Education: Minimum requirements include Bachelor of Science degree from an accredited university with major studies in foods and human nutrition or nursing. Preference is given to those who have a Master of Science (MS), Master of Public Health (MPH), or a Doctor of Medicine (MD) degree.
- Experience: Minimum of five years' experience in a public health setting is preferred. Minimum of two years' WIC experience is required.

Knowledge, Skills, Abilities

All knowledge, skills, and abilities included in the LA WIC Director description, plus: Ability to manage multiagency agreements, training, staffing, and resource management.

Responsibilities/Duties

All Responsibilities/Duties included in the LA WIC Director description, plus:

WIC High Risk Counselors (RD/RN)

The WIC High Risk Counselor performs professional and supervisory public health nutrition activities by delivering direct care participant services as well as participating in program planning and evaluation as assigned. In small agencies, this professional may be the same individual as the WIC Director. The WIC High Risk Counselor works under the supervision of the LA WIC Director and may supervise the WIC Educator and/or other WIC High Risk Counselors as assigned.

- Nutritionist
- Registered and/or Licensed Dietitian
- Community High Risk Counselor
- Public Health High Risk Counselor

Oualifications

- Because WIC is a nutrition program, the job of the WIC High Risk Counselor is ideally held by a Registered
 and/or Licensed Dietitian (RDN/RD) approved by the Commission on Dietetic Registration. When a
 Registered/Licensed Dietitian is not available, an individual with a Bachelor of Science degree in a nutritionrelated field may function as the WIC High Risk Counselor with State approval.
- Individuals with the following qualification also qualify to perform the duties of the WIC High Risk Counselor: Licensed Physicians (MD) (licensed by the Colorado Medical Board to practice in the State of Colorado), Physician's Assistants (PA) (licensed by the Colorado Medical Board to practice under supervision of a physician in the State of Colorado), Registered Nurses (BSN or RN licensed to practice in the State of Colorado).
- Education: Minimum of a Bachelor of Science degree from an accredited university with major studies in foods and human nutrition or in nursing.
- Experience: Experience in ambulatory care, public health, or clinical setting.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

A fully functioning WIC High Risk Counselor will need the knowledge, skills, and abilities listed below. In hiring for this position, a supervisor should look for persons possessing the majority of these skills:

- Knowledge of human nutrition in health and disease and its application to public health practices.
- Knowledge of nutrition needs for infants and children and women during the prenatal, postpartum, and breastfeeding stages.
- Knowledge of effective counseling and educational concepts and methods.
- · Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.
- · Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.
- Ability to develop and carry out ongoing plans for nutrition education.
- · Ability to interpret scientific information for lay audiences.
- Knowledge and understanding of the high risk functions related to the Compass computer system.
- Ability to assess nutritional status, design nutritional care plans, and counsel participants toward improved diets with behavior change.
- · Ability to promote breastfeeding as the optimal infant feeding choice while allowing participant choice.
- · Ability to be understanding and empathetic when dealing with participants.
- · Ability to prepare educational materials and prepare and deliver in service trainings.
- · Ability to supervise paraprofessional/professional staff as needed to assist the WIC Director/Coordinator.

Responsibilities/Duties

- Interviews participants and makes thorough nutrition assessments by interpreting anthropometrics and laboratory data, health histories, medical diagnoses, physician's orders, eating habits and nutrition practices, diet assessments, and other related factors.
- Develops, implements, evaluates, and follows up on participant care plans. Counsels participants and families on nutritional needs with consideration of income, cultural and religious food patterns, home facilities, educational level, and other psychosocial factors.
- Maintains participant confidentiality and ensures that participants are treated equally with respect, compassion, and empathy.
- Consults with health care providers on participants' nutritional needs, formula requiring prescription, and health concerns; makes appropriate referrals and follow up.
- Provides appropriate documentation in participant electronic charts, including participant concerns, nutrition assessment, and materials provided, nutrition education, referrals, and progress toward attaining new behavior change nutrition goals, and follow up plans.
- Counsels all high risk participants at least once during a certification period and within the required time frame.
- Determines follow up care for as long as the participant is considered high risk.
- · Completes the WIC Lactation Specialist (WLS) training when offered next.



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- Provides information on the benefits of breastfeeding, aids in breastfeeding promotion in the clinic, offers praise for breastfeeding, and refers staff to IBCLCs as necessary.
- Assesses need and issues breast pumps, instructs on pump use and milk collection/storage, as needed.
- Assesses and provides counseling on common and complex breastfeeding problems, including WIC breastfeeding risk factors and provides high risk follow up, as necessary.
- Authorizes the use of exempt infant formulas, WIC-eligible medical foods, and individual needs for certain tailoring of WIC food packages.
- Reviews and signs as the authorized certifying professional for WIC Educators who have not completed Level I of the WIC Certification Program.
- Provides nutrition education through individual and/or group instruction to participants, professionals, and community groups.
- Helps orient, train, supervise, and evaluate WIC paraprofessionals, volunteers, and clerical staff as assigned.
- Conducts and/or assists with in service education for staff and professional groups.
- Reviews, evaluates, and/or develops nutrition education materials.
- Participates in Program planning development and evaluation; works on assigned nutrition projects.
- Acts as a resource person for nutrition information.
- Assists with outreach and public relation activities.
- Participates in monitoring electronic charts, paper files, clinic activities, nutrition education, and counseling.
- Participates in continuing education activities; attends meetings, conferences, and workshops; keeps abreast of current nutrition research as it relates to the WIC Program and participants.
- Participates in staff conferences, meetings, in service training, and State meetings.

WIC Educator

The WIC Educator delivers WIC services to participants by determining and documenting eligibility, issuing food benefits, maintaining participant and Program electronic records and paper files related to participant certification, interviewing, providing nutrition education with behavior change goals, and developing individual care plans based on a sound understanding of nutritional concepts.

The WIC Educator develops proficiency in providing the full range of WIC services to participants. Titles of these individuals might include Lead WIC Educator, Administrative WIC Educator, WIC Receptionist, WIC Technician, WIC Clerk, or WIC Program Assistant. Lead WIC Educators are typically assigned higher level duties such as training and supervising other staff.

The WIC Educator is expected to work under minimal supervision and to exercise independent judgment and a high degree of initiative within established procedures. The Educator works under the supervision of the WIC Director, WIC High Risk Counselor or designated WIC Supervisor.

Qualifications

- Because WIC is a nutrition program, the job of WIC Educator is ideally held by a Diet Technician (someone
 who has a two-year degree in nutrition science). Also highly desirable in this position is a Licensed Practical
 Nurse (LPN). All persons hired as a WIC Educator must complete the WIC Certification Program modules
 within defined timelines.
- · Education: Minimum high school diploma or GED.
- Experience: Previous work experience with the public. WIC and/or public health experience and experience with low income participants is preferred.
- Special Qualifications: Bilingual (Spanish) desirable.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

A fully functioning WIC Educator will need all of the knowledge, skills, and abilities listed here. In hiring for the position, a supervisor should look for the first ten skills. The last six can be learned on the job.

- · Knowledge of business English, spelling, and math.
- Knowledge of standard office practices and procedures.
- Knowledge of socio economic conditions of local community and social agencies.



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- Ability to operate standard office equipment, including a computer.
- Ability to read and interpret a variety of complex rules, regulations, and other materials.
- Ability to prepare and maintain accurate and neat records.
- Ability to provide participant services to assigned caseload and complete paperwork within time limits.
- Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.
- Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.
- Ability to work with minimal supervision; ability to work as a team member.
- Ability to pass the WIC Certification Program with the required passing scores for Level I II and III.
- Ability to work with height/length, weight, and measuring devices.
- Ability to perform finger stick blood tests to determine hematocrit or hemoglobin levels.
- Knowledge of effective interviewing and counseling techniques.
- Knowledge of nutrition and nutritional concepts.
- Ability to promote breastfeeding as the optimal infant feeding choice while allowing participant choice.

Responsibilities/Duties

- · Completes the WIC Certification Program within the timelines defined.
- Explains the Program to prospective participants; takes applications over the phone and in person; maintains waiting lists by priority and prescreening list, when necessary.
- Provides assistance in completing the certification process for people who have difficulty in speaking or writing.
- · Schedules appointments with participants and follows up on participants who miss their appointments.
- Takes accurate health assessments at specified intervals involving heights, lengths, weights, and hematocrit
 or hemoglobin measurements; accurately enters this information into the Compass computer system and/or
 routes to appropriate person.
- · Collects comprehensive diet information with a participant centered positive approach.
- Determines and documents complete Program eligibility; identifies all relevant risk factors; enrolls participants; reevaluates participants for continued Program eligibility.
- Determines and tailors food packages to individual needs; documents tailoring; and issues food benefits.
- Provides full explanation of the Program to participants to prevent and help resolve participant misuse; explains purpose of the WIC food package and the nutrients provided.
- Educates participants on the Colorado WIC Program Food List & Shopping Guide.
- Assesses need for and refers participants to appropriate health care and social service programs; makes individual referrals to health/social professionals and follows up referrals.
- Assists participants with individual nutrition education plans; dialogues with participants to identify appropriate behavior change goals; makes appropriate referrals; follows up and documents progress toward goals; reevaluates and establishes new goals; follows protocols.
- Identifies high risk participants according to the definition and makes appropriate referrals to the WIC High Risk Counselor.
- Provides information on the benefits of breastfeeding, aids in breastfeeding promotion in the clinic, offers
 praise for breastfeeding, conducts breastfeeding education classes and support groups (as able/necessary)
 and refers to WIC High Risk Counselor, DBE, Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials, or Educator WIC
 Lactation Specialist (WLS).
- Maintains confidentiality of participants and ensures that participants are treated equally with respect, compassion, and empathy.
- Understands retailer requirements; documents participant and retailer requests or problems and resolves simple problems; refers more complex or repeated problems for resolution.
- Ensures all equipment is clean and maintained in working order and tested for accuracy at regular intervals.
- Orders and maintains adequate inventory of office supplies, clinical supplies, forms, educational pamphlets, eWIC card stock, and other materials for the clinic site.
- · Participates in on-going training on the Compass computer system.
- Highly encouraged to attend the WIC Lactation Specialist Training to become a WLS.

Local Agency Retailer Coordinator (LARC)

WIC contact person for the state office and for the WIC retailers regarding food delivery topics. Communicate with local retailers regarding current WIC policy and procedures. Complete retailer monitoring as



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needed. Follow up with participants and store complaints and concerns. The Local Agency Retailer Coordinator (LARC) works under the supervision of the WIC Director, WIC High Risk Counselor or designated WIC Supervisor.

Qualifications

- · Education: Minimum high school diploma or GED.
- Experience: Previous work experience with the public. WIC and/or public health experience and experience with low income participants is preferred. Experience with retail stores and/or cashier experience is helpful.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities (See the complete listing of skills for the WIC Educator position)

- Ability to read and interpret the WIC retailer rules and regulations.
- Ability to prepare and maintain accurate and neat records.
- · Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.
- Ability to assist with conflict resolution and confidentiality issues.
- Knowledge of effective counseling and education concepts and methods.
- Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.
- · Ability to deliver orientation/training/monitoring sessions to various levels of retail staff.

Responsibilities/Duties

(See Local Agency Retailer Coordinator (LARC) Roles and Responsibilities in Section 1: Vendor and Farmer Management for detailed listing of local agency management of stores.)

- Sets up a process so that any staff member can record comments or problems. Keeping detailed, precise records is the key to effective coordination between the State, Local Agency and retailers.
- · Conducts pre-authorization visits.
- Collects and maintains retailer reports from State WIC staff detailing WIC food benefit redemption, inventory and/or volume history. Assists with training and problem resolution, as needed, for the store.
- Completes training and orientation visit for all new WIC retailers, including shelf surveys.
- Conducts informal site visits and retailer monitoring visits using the Retailer Monitoring Report form.
 - Reviews WIC policy and procedures such as redeeming food benefits, the *Colorado WIC Food List & Shopping Guide*, stocking requirements, with the local agency, retailers, and participants as appropriate.
 - Develops processes for tracking and resolving retailer and participant complaints and/or problems.
 - o Participates, as appropriate, in State WIC retailer coordination meetings and conference calls.
 - Provides written documentation supporting sanctions/disqualifications of participants and/or retailers if needed, including testifying at Fair Hearing Procedures.
 - Provide retailer coordination guidance to local agency staff.

Local Agency Outreach Coordinator

Publicizes the availability of the WIC Program, builds an outreach network, informs organizations in the outreach network about the WIC Program, and coordinates with other community resources to increase the WIC caseload. Outreach Coordinator works under the supervision of the WIC Director, WIC High Risk Counselor or designated WIC Supervisor.

Qualifications

- Education: (See the education and qualifications listed for all of the WIC positions)
- Experience: Previous work experience with the public. WIC and/or public health experience and experience with low income participants is preferred. Experience with other community programs and agencies plus work with various media is helpful.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities (See the complete listing of skills for the WIC Educator, WIC High Risk Counselor.)

- Ability to coordinate and chair a committee.
- Ability to evaluate all possible outreach approaches and possible audiences.
- · Ability to work with a variety of media.
- · Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.

Responsibilities/Duties



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- Coordinates outreach planning with the WIC Director, the WIC staff, an outreach committee or task force.
- Publicizes the availability of the WIC Program.
- Establishes an outreach network with community agencies/programs serving similar populations.
- Educates the agencies/organizations about the WIC Program and how possible participants can apply.
- Documents outreach activities, agencies contacted and the date of completion.
- Assists the LA WIC Director with updating the referral list in Compass.
- Under the direction of the LA WIC Director, performs duties associated with the WIC Referral System (WRS).

Local Agency Breastfeeding Coordinator

Every WIC agency in Colorado has a designated LA Breastfeeding Coordinator, although larger agencies may have a designated coordinator at each clinic. The Breastfeeding Coordinator is responsible for coordinating breastfeeding promotion and support activities for the agency or clinic in collaboration with the agency's WIC Director. The LA Breastfeeding Coordinator works under the supervision of the WIC Director, WIC High Risk Counselor or designated WIC Supervisor.

Qualifications

- Education: Minimally, has received at least 20 hours of training in breastfeeding promotion and support beyond the WIC Certification Program (e.g., breastfeeding workshops; WIC breastfeeding training, State WIC Meetings, WLS, CLC, CLE, or IBCLC).
- Experience: Previous work experience with the public and/or community programs. Breastfeeding experience is desirable, but not required.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities (See complete listing of skills for the WIC Educator position.)

- Ability to disseminate and implement appropriate policies and guidelines that support and promote breastfeeding as the preferred method of infant feeding.
- Ability to collaborate with prenatal, well child, and family planning programs, hospitals, and/or other community health care providers to coordinate breastfeeding promotion and support activities.
- Ability to prepare and maintain accurate and neat records, and submit reports to the State Office in a timely manner.
- Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.

Responsibilities/Duties

- The clinic/agency environment is breastfeeding-friendly by implementing the following requirements:
 - Portray breastfeeding as the preferred infant-feeding method in a culturally and aesthetically appropriate manner.
 - Establish a positive attitude toward breastfeeding by clinic and agency staff.
 - Avoid use of printed and audiovisual materials and office supplies developed by formula manufacturers in any WIC clinic.
 - Store infant formula in areas not visible to the WIC participant.
 - Provide a supportive clinic environment in which women feel comfortable breastfeeding their infant.
 - o Incorporate positive peer influence into the prenatal period through use of peer counselors, bulletin boards that display successful breastfeeding mothers and infants, or hosting sessions where pregnant women can talk with breastfeeding women, and/or scheduling pregnant and breastfeeding women at the same time.
 - Include participants' family and friends in breastfeeding education sessions.
 - Issue a formula package consistent with the mother's breastfeeding goals and the infant's nutritional needs.
- Systems/programs are in place to provide timely support services to breastfeeding women and infants. Activities may include:
 - Create procedures to ensure breastfeeding women and infants are certified within 7 to 10 days of delivery.
 - o Coordinate in-services on assessing the breastfeeding dyad.
 - Collaborate with community programs/organizations to identify or develop systems of support (e.g., La Leche League, local hospital lactation programs, home visitation program, public health nursing).
 - o Coordinate a telephone follow-up program.



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- Regularly assess agency needs for breast pumps and supplies and, in collaboration with WIC Director, completes breast pump and supply order form.
- o Review policies and procedures for issuing breast pumps and supplies with all staff periodically.
- Use breastfeeding reports to identify common reasons women cease breastfeeding and develop strategies to address barriers.
- o Track breastfeeding rates for the agency/clinic.
- o Participate in Breastfeeding Coordinator conference calls, meetings, and other activities with the state breastfeeding coordinator.
- Ensures all staff members are competent in providing breastfeeding education and support. Activities may include:
 - o Orient new employees on the agency's breastfeeding activities and services, WIC policies and procedures, and the Program's breastfeeding goals.
 - Assess staff training needs and coordinate training opportunities as appropriate, including referring staff to complete the WLS training program.
 - Plan and implement breastfeeding continuing education for staff annually.
 - Review participant breastfeeding education materials and staff training materials annually to ensure they are up-to-date and accessible to staff.
 - o Apprise staff of changes in WIC breastfeeding policies, procedures, or recommendations. Review tailoring of the breastfeeding infant food package with staff on a regular basis.
 - O Work with the LA Director to include questions in the interview process for prospective employee's ability to provide breastfeeding education as well as in the annual evaluation process of the employee.
 - Serve as a breastfeeding resource person for staff (e.g., is well versed in Colorado WIC breastfeeding policies and procedures, maintains local agency/clinic breastfeeding library [books and videos], and materials needed to complete the Breastfeeding Module).
 - o Coach staff to build their skills in providing breastfeeding education and support.
- The clinic/agency staff actively promotes and supports breastfeeding to the WIC population and community. Activities may include:
 - o Coordinate activities to celebrate WIC National Breastfeeding Week.
 - o Present to local organizations and health care programs on the services provided by WIC emphasizing breastfeeding education and support services.
 - o Participate in the local breastfeeding task force or possibly initiate the development of a task force if one does not exist.
 - Submit breastfeeding articles and public service announcements to local media.

Educator WIC Lactation Specialist (Educator WLS)/Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials

This is an enhanced role for a WIC Educator who has received higher level breastfeeding education through the Colorado WIC Lactation Specialist (WLS) training and/or advanced lactation credentials (CLC, CLE or IBCLC) and has developed their expertise. The following roles and responsibilities are within the scope of practice for an Educator WLS and/or Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials:

Qualifications

- Meets qualifications of a WIC Educator.
- Education:
 - Educator WLS Minimally, has participated in the Colorado WLS training.
 - Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials Minimally, has obtained advanced lactation credential (CLC, CLE, or IBCLC) from an accredited program including completing course work, passing an exam and maintaining the credential as required by the accrediting body (e.g., continuing education credits, fees).
- Experience: Previous work experience with the public and/or community programs.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities (see WIC Educator role for complete listing)

- Ability to disseminate and implement appropriate policies and guidelines that support and promote breastfeeding as the preferred method of infant feeding.
- · Ability to review evidence-based literature and apply to practice.



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Ability to pass the WLS or CLC, CLE, or IBCLC exam at the completion of the training [and pass two required WLS observations (unless already CLC, CLE or IBCLC certified)].

Responsibilities/Duties

- Assesses and provides counseling on common and complex breastfeeding problems.
- Performs the counseling expectations described in the "Breastfeeding Complications or Potential Complications (602/603)" content in the High and Low Risk Protocol policy.
- Provides prenatal anticipatory guidance [responding to concerns and issues about breastfeeding; such as, reinforcing that it takes about a month to establish milk supply; no formula first month; what to request in the hospital (Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative's Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding), issues returning to work or school; hand expression; breastfeeding resources in community].
- Responds to participant breastfeeding questions, providing information on the benefits of breastfeeding, offering praise for breastfeeding, and aids in breastfeeding promotion activities in the clinic.
- Assesses need, coordinates and loans/issues breast pumps and supplies, instructs on pump use and milk collection/storage.

Optional Functions

- · Teaching participant breastfeeding classes and/or leading breastfeeding support groups.
- Providing support calls to mothers prenatally or early postpartum to offer encouragement and respond to questions, including after pump issuance.
- · Recommending breast shells, breast pads, and other breastfeeding aids.

High Risk Counselor WIC Lactation Specialist (WLS)/High Risk Counselor Advanced Lactation Credentials

All High Risk Counselors are required to participate in a training to be able to function as a WIC Lactation Specialist (WLS). High Risk Counselors may also obtain advanced lactation credentials (CLC, CLE, IBCLC) to further their expertise and support for participants. The following roles and responsibilities are within the scope of practice for High Risk Counselor WLS and/or High Risk Counselor Advanced Lactation Credentials.

Oualifications

- Meets qualifications of High Risk Counselor.
- Education:
 - High Risk Counselor WLS: Minimally, has participated in the Colorado WIC WLS training.
 - High Risk Counselor Advanced Lactation Credentials Minimally, has obtained advanced lactation credential from an accredited program (CLC, CLE, IBCLC) including completing course work, passing an exam and maintaining the credential as required by the accrediting body (e.g., continuing education credits, fees).
- Experience: Previous work experience with the public and/or community programs.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

In addition to the following, see complete listing for High Risk Counselors and Educators in Local Staffing section, respectively.

- Ability to disseminate and implement appropriate policies and guidelines that support and promote breastfeeding as the preferred method of infant feeding.
- Ability to review evidence based literature and apply to practice.
- High Risk Counselor WLS Ability to pass the WLS exam at the completion of the training course. High Risk Counselor Advanced Lactation Credentials - Ability to pass the CLC, CLE, and/or IBCLC exam at the completion of the training course(s) and any required observations.

Responsibilities/Duties

- · Mentors Educator WLS and BFPC WLS.
- Performs the counseling expectations described in the "Breastfeeding Complications or Potential Complications (602/603)" content in the *High and Low Risk Protocols* policy.



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- Provides high risk follow-up to a mother and infant within two weeks of risk assignment of NRF 602/603 if initial 24-hour high risk counseling was provided by an Educator WLS.
- Provides prenatal anticipatory guidance (responding to concerns and issues about breastfeeding; reinforces that it takes about a month to establish milk supply; no formula first month; what to request in the hospital; issues for returning to work or school; hand expression; breastfeeding resources in community).
- Assesses need, coordinates and loans/issues breast pumps and supplies. Can delegate to Educator WLS or Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials.
- Makes referrals to health care providers, IBCLC or hospital lactation staff.
- Contacts participant's health care provider to discuss concerns (e.g. medications and breast milk; formula supplementation prescriptions).
- Responds to participant breastfeeding questions.
- Recommends breast shells, breast pads, and other breastfeeding aids.
- Troubleshoots breastfeeding concerns such as inadequate milk supply (perceived or real) and solutions for engorgement.

Optional Functions

- Teaching breastfeeding classes and/or leading support groups.
- Providing support calls to mothers prenatally or early postpartum to offer encouragement and respond to questions.

Designated Breastfeeding Expert

The Designated Breastfeeding Expert (DBE) has special training and experience helping mothers with complex breastfeeding problems that are outside the scope of practice of BFPCs and other WIC staff. The DBE operates within the policies and procedures of the WIC program and within the context of WIC's role for breastfeeding support. Each LA operating a BFPC program is required to have access to a DBE to assist WIC participants with complex breastfeeding challenges in a timely manner. This role is typically fulfilled by the LA BFPC Coordinator.

Qualifications

- Education:
 - Is a Registered Dietitian, Nutritionist (Master's or Bachelor's degree in Nutritional Sciences, Community Nutrition, Clinical Nutrition, Dietetics, Public Health Nutrition or Home Economics with emphasis in Nutrition), IBCLC, health care provider, registered nurse, physician's assistants certified by the National Committee on Certification of Physician's Assistants or has completed a minimum of 8 college courses from an Accredited Institution in the Health Sciences (suggested coursework includes, but is not limited to the following areas: Human Anatomy, Human Physiology, Biology, Infant Growth and Development, Nutrition, Counseling Skills, Sociology, Introduction to Clinical Research, etc.).
 - o Successful completion of the FNS competency-based training for WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum (levels 1-4) or completion of a State-approved competency-based breastfeeding training that is consistent with the FNS WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum.
- Experience:
 - Experience working with low-income breastfeeding mothers and infants who experience complex breastfeeding challenges.
 - Minimum of one year of experience in counseling breastfeeding mother/infant dyads.
 - o Experience providing breastfeeding training/education.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

A fully functioning DBE will have the following skills or be able to learn them on the job.

- Knowledge of socio-economic conditions of the local community.
- Critical thinking and problem solving.
- Breastfeeding Assessment and Care Plan Development.
- Ability to clearly communicate complex care plans to the WIC breastfeeding team, as appropriate.

Responsibilities/Duties

The WIC DBE duties include, but are not limited to:

· Acts on referrals from BFPCs regarding complex breastfeeding challenges beyond their scope of practice.



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- Assesses, contributes towards the development of a care plan and counsels the mother/infant dyad with complex breastfeeding challenges.
- Performing the counseling expectations described in the "Breastfeeding Complications or Potential Complications (602/603)" content in the *High and Low Risk Protocols* policy.
- Communicates care plan to the rest of the WIC breastfeeding team, as appropriate.
- Refers participants to health care providers for further assessment and medical care when needed.
- Refers to hospital lactation staff and community breastfeeding support resources, as necessary.
- Assesses need, coordinating and loaning/issuing breast pumps and supplies. Can delegate to Educators or High Risk Counselors who are WLSs or have advanced lactation credentials.
- Recommending breast shells, breast pads, and other breastfeeding aids and administering/overseeing supplemental nursing systems (SNS) as necessary.
- Mentors all other WIC staff, specifically Educator WLS, BFPC WLS and High Risk Counselor WLS.
- Maintains lactation credentials and certifications.

Optional Functions

- Teaching breastfeeding classes and/or leading support groups.
- Providing breastfeeding trainings for WIC staff and serving as a resource and mentor.
- Promoting breastfeeding within the community.

Designated Breastfeeding Expert IBCLC

The Designated Breastfeeding Expert IBCLC (WIC DBE-IBCLC) has special training and expertise assisting participants with complex breastfeeding problems. This position requires completion of both DBE requirements and IBCLC credential. This position is optional and can be combined with other WIC staffing roles, or as its own position within the LA.

Qualifications

- Meets qualifications of WIC DBE.
- · Education:
 - o Minimally, has obtained and maintained the International Board Certified Lactation Consultant (IBCLC) credential as provided by and verified by the International Board of Lactation Consultant Examiners (IBLCE).
 - Successful completion of the FNS competency-based training for WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum (levels 1-4) or completion of a State-approved competency-based breastfeeding training that is consistent with the FNS WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum.
 - o Maintains consistent continuing education credits and stays up to date on best practices related to lactation.
- Experience:
 - o Advanced experience assisting families with complex breastfeeding challenges.
 - o Experience working with low-income breastfeeding mothers and infants who experience complex breastfeeding challenges.
 - Minimum of one year of experience in counseling breastfeeding mother/infant dyads.
 - Experience providing breastfeeding training/education to colleagues, health care professionals, and the general public.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

A fully functioning WIC DBE-IBCLC will have the following skills or be able to learn them on the job.

- Knowledge of socio-economic conditions of the local community.
- Critical thinking and problem solving.
- Breastfeeding Assessment and Care Plan Development.
- Ability to clearly communicate complex care plans to the WIC breastfeeding team, as appropriate.

Responsibilities/Duties

The WIC DBE-IBCLC duties include, but are not limited to:

• Acts as the breastfeeding expert for the agency, responding to referrals from WIC staff and BFPCs regarding complex breastfeeding challenges beyond their scope of practice.



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- Troubleshoots breastfeeding concerns such as inadequate milk supply (perceived or real) and solutions for engorgement.
- Assesses, contributes towards the development of a care plan and counsels the mother/infant dyad with complex breastfeeding challenges.
- Performs the counseling expectations described in the "Breastfeeding Complications or Potential Complications (602/603)" content in the *High and Low Risk Protocols* policy.
- Communicates care plan to the rest of the WIC breastfeeding team, as appropriate.
- Contacts participant's health care provider to discuss concerns (e.g. medications and breast milk; formula supplementation prescriptions).
- Refers to hospital lactation staff and community breastfeeding support resources, as necessary.
- Provides prenatal support and guidance (responds to advanced concerns and issues about breastfeeding; addresses potential physiological challenges that would inhibit/limit breastfeeding; sets expectations for birth and early postpartum, including support to request at the hospital).
- Assesses need, coordinates and loans/issues breast pumps and supplies. Can delegate to Educator/High Risk Counselor WLS.
- Recommends breast shells, breast pads, and other breastfeeding aids and administers/oversees supplemental nursing systems (SNS) as necessary.
- Mentors all other WIC staff, specifically Educator WLS, BFPC WLS and High Risk Counselor WLS.
- Maintains IBCLC credentials and obtains appropriate continuing education credits through training opportunities annually.

Optional Functions

- Teaching breastfeeding classes and/or leading support groups.
- Providing breastfeeding trainings for WIC staff.
- Promoting breastfeeding within the community, especially outreach with health care providers.
- Providing support calls to mothers prenatally or early postpartum to offer encouragement and respond to questions.

Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program Coordinator

The WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counseling (BFPC) Program Coordinator manages the BFPC Program at the local agency level and works under the direction of the LA WIC Director.

Qualifications

- Education:
 - o Minimum high school diploma or GED and advanced lactation credentials, such as Certified Lactation Counselor (CLC) or Certified Lactation Educator (CLE). IBCLC preferred.
 - Successful completion of the FNS competency-based training for WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum (levels 1-4) or completion of a State-approved competency-based breastfeeding training that is consistent with the FNS WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum.
 - Successful completion of the FNS WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum: Peer Counseling Management training.
- Experience:
 - Previous work experience with the public. WIC and/or public health experience and experience with lowincome participants is preferred.
 - o Has a minimum of one-year experience counseling breastfeeding women.
 - o Has experience in program management.
 - Has demonstrated experience in supervision.
 - Has demonstrated expertise in breastfeeding management and promotion.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

A fully functioning breastfeeding peer counselor program supervisor/coordinator will have the following skills or be able to learn them on the job.

- · Knowledge of socio-economic conditions of the local community.
- · Ability to read and interpret a variety of materials.
- Ability to prepare and maintain accurate, neat records.
- · Abilities to provide services to the assigned caseload and complete paperwork within time limits.
- · Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.



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- Ability to communicate effectively orally and in brief writing.
- Ability to work as a team member.
- Ability to complete WIC and breastfeeding information modules.

Responsibilities/Duties

The LA BFPC Coordinator duties include, but are not limited to:

- Assists in establishing program goals and objectives.
- Assists in establishing BFPC program protocols and policies.
- Assures that the BFPC program follows the FNS WIC Breastfeeding Model Components for Peer Counseling.
- Determines BFPC program staffing needs.
- · Recruits and interviews potential BFPCs in alignment with program policies and standards.
- Arranges training of BFPCs.
- Mentor new BFPCs during the first three months and provide ongoing supervision
- · Holds monthly meetings with BFPCs.
- · Reviews documentation records and data as appropriate.
- Monitors the program, including conducting spot checks.
- Routinely reports on the program to supervisor and State BFPC Program Coordinator.
- Works with other BFPC supervisors (if available) to assess for ongoing improvements to the program that may be needed.
- Arranges for availability of WIC Designated Breastfeeding Expert (DBE) for managing complex breastfeeding problems beyond the scope of the peer counselor. (Note: May also serve as the LA's DBE.)

Breastfeeding Peer Counselor

The WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counselor (BFPC) is a paraprofessional support person who provides basic breastfeeding information and encouragement to pregnant and breastfeeding WIC participants who are pregnant or breastfeeding. The BFPC is required to document contacts and make referrals to lactation experts when concerns are beyond their scope of practice.

Note: New hires should not have professional training in health, nutrition, or the clinical management of breastfeeding (e.g. CLC, CLE or IBCLC).

Supervision

WIC BFPCs work under the supervision of the LA BFPC Program Coordinator or WIC Director.

Qualifications

To ensure that the BFPC relates with a WIC mother, the position qualifications are:

- · Has breastfed at least one baby for at least 6 months (does not have to be currently breastfeeding).
- Is enthusiastic about breastfeeding, and wants to help other mothers enjoy a positive experience.
- Bilingual (Spanish/English) preferred but not required.
- Can work a set number of hours a week (as established by the local agency) and is available to WIC
 participants outside usual clinic hours.
- · Completes the FNS WIC Breastfeeding Curriculum training for BFPCs and all required orientation activities.

Knowledge, Skill and Abilities

A fully functioning BFPC already has the following skills and/or learns them on the job.

- · Knowledge of socio-economic conditions of the local community.
- Ability to read and interpret a variety of materials.
- Ability to prepare and maintain accurate, neat records.
- Abilities to provide services to the assigned caseload and complete paperwork within time limits.
- · Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.
- · Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing.
- · Ability to work as a team member.
- Ability to complete WIC and breastfeeding information modules.

Responsibilities/Duties



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- Counsels pregnant and breastfeeding WIC participants through phone calls, text messaging, clinic visits, home visits, and/or hospital visits at scheduled intervals determined by the LA.
- Receives a caseload of pregnant and breastfeeding WIC participants and makes routine periodic contacts.
- Provides basic breastfeeding information and support to new mothers, including telling them about the benefits of breastfeeding, overcoming common barriers, and getting a good start with breastfeeding. Helps mothers prevent and handle common breastfeeding concerns.
- May be available outside usual 8 to 5 working hours to new mothers who are having breastfeeding problems.
- Maintains confidentiality.
- Keeps accurate records of all contacts made with WIC participants.
- Refers mothers, according to clinic-established protocols, to appropriate resources:
 - WIC BFPC Coordinator, DBE, High Risk Counselor, Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials, or Educator WLS.
 - o Lactation consultant.
 - o Health care providers.
 - o Public health programs in the community.
 - Social service agencies.
- Attends and assists with prenatal classes and breastfeeding support groups.
- Attends monthly staff meetings and breastfeeding conferences/workshops as appropriate.
- Reads assigned books and materials on breastfeeding that are provided by the supervisor.
- May assist WIC staff in promoting the BFPC program through special projects and duties as assigned.

Breastfeeding Peer Counselor WIC Lactation Specialist (BFPC WLS)

This is an enhanced role for Breastfeeding Peer Counselors (BFPCs) who have expertise in breastfeeding counseling and management through previous experience as a BFPC and additional lactation training (e.g. Colorado WLS training) and who can maintain their role as a peer connecting with a peer. This enhanced role is not necessarily available to any peer who has attended the WLS training. Supervisors must consider each BFPC individually (knowledge, skill, desire, etc.) to assess if they fit the criteria and can continue to be a BFPC while having this additional knowledge.

Note:

- BFPCs must have at least 12 months of work experience in the role in order to attend the WLS training. This requirement can be flexed per the discretion of the LA BFPC Coordinator.
- BFPCs should not be in the role of educator or teacher. BFPCs should be considered part of the team for the care of the mother/baby and should know when to yield to the WIC BFPC Coordinator, DBE, High Risk Counselor, Educator Advanced Lactation Credentials, or Educator WLS.

Qualifications

- Meets qualifications of a WIC BFPC.
- Education: Minimally, has participated in the Colorado WIC Lactation Specialist (WLS) training.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

In addition to the following, see complete listing for BFPC.

· Ability to pass the WLS exam at the completion of the training and pass two required WLS observations.

Responsibilities/Duties

- Provides prenatal anticipatory guidance [responding to concerns and issues about breastfeeding; such as, reinforcing that it takes about a month to establish milk supply; no formula first month; what to request in the hospital (Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative's Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding), issues returning to work or school; hand expression; breastfeeding resources in community].
- Provides support calls to mothers prenatally or early postpartum to offer encouragement and respond to questions.
- Responds to participant breastfeeding questions.
- Troubleshoots breastfeeding concerns such as inadequate milk supply (perceived or real) and solutions for engorgement.



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Optional Functions

- Assessing need, coordinating and loaning/issuing breast pumps and supplies, instructing on pump use and milk collection/storage for BFPC participants.
- Leading breastfeeding support groups and classes. (Note: BFPC funds are to support programs beyond
 current operations and breastfeeding classes are considered current operations. If a BFPC WLS leads a
 breastfeeding class, the funds should come from the WIC budget rather than the BFPC budget. As support
 groups are not considered current operations, BFPC funds can be used to pay for the BFPC's time to lead
 these groups.)
- Depending on level of skill and knowledge of supervision, could serve as the LA BFPC Coordinator.

NOTE: Out of Scope for all Colorado WIC Program Staff

- Recommending use of a galactagogue should refer to the mother's health care provider, hospital lactation or IBCLC in the community.
- Recommending treatment for or diagnosing breast yeast or bacterial infection or breastfeeding or breast milk jaundice - should refer to a health care provider.
- Fitting and placement of nipple shields should refer to hospital lactation or IBCLC in the community.
- Diagnosing based on infant test weights done in the WIC clinic.
- Recommending a specialized infant formula when supplementation is medically warranted. Staff should refer the mother back to the health care provider.

Non-WIC Staff with WIC Program Duties

LA WIC Directors may assign WIC duties to agency staff not considered WIC employees. For example, a non-WIC staff may be assigned to obtain heights, weights, and hemoglobin/hematocrit measurements. Most often, these staff persons have limited access to Compass. To ensure these individuals are adequately trained, the WIC Director develops a training plan to provide the individual with the skills and knowledge needed to perform her/his work. State Office Nutrition Consultants are available to assist.

All non-WIC staff must complete three WIC training topics: Civil Rights, Customer Service, and Breastfeeding. The training for these topics along with the topics pertinent to the staffs' position responsibilities can be acquired from a variety of training options. The options include:

- · Review of pertinent areas of the current Colorado WIC Program Manual; and/or
- Completing the online Compass Training course; and/or
- · Completion of Level I, II or III.

The supervisor is required to document the training that was provided for the individual including the topics, method of training, test scores, and dates of completion. This information must be kept in the employee's file and electronically entered into Compass, Staff Competencies. Should the non-WIC staff not have Compass access, maintain documentation of provided training in a separate file.

Standards for Use of Volunteers in WIC Clinics

WIC clinics are continually challenged with the problem of how to improve quality services with limited financial resources. One of the creative solutions to this problem has been the use of volunteers in the clinic. One concern when using volunteers is to see that they receive quality training and appropriate supervision. This is necessary to ensure participants receive a high level of care and WIC protocols and procedures are maintained.

LAs may have a volunteer coordinator and established policies for using volunteers. It is recommended that LAs coordinate WIC volunteer services within the agency policies. The following standards must be followed when beginning a volunteer program for WIC:

- · LAs will discuss the plan for use of volunteers with the State Office assigned nutrition consultant.
- Program administrators will check LA policies regarding insurance, legal liability, and confidentiality concerning the use of volunteers in the agency setting.

- All volunteers will receive direct supervision from a WIC administrative professional and/or WIC
 Supervisor. Supervision must include ongoing coaching and feedback and a yearly performance evaluation.

- Volunteers are used in different capacities based on their interests and skills and the agency's needs. Some of the activities that volunteers have been used for include intake eligibility work (e.g., helps participants with completion of forms); clerical work (e.g., filing, typing, answering the phone, folding pamphlets, organizing pamphlets); and height and weight screening (e.g., takes heights and weights).
- Volunteers must not determine nutrition risk, nutrition eligibility, or issue, WIC food benefits.

An appropriate training plan must be developed based on assigned duties. The training plan should be developed based on the tasks the individual is responsible for in the WIC clinic. The supervisor is required to document the training that was provided for the individual including the topics, method of training, test scores, and dates of completion. This information should be kept in the volunteer's file and electronically entered into the Compass computer system, if appropriate.

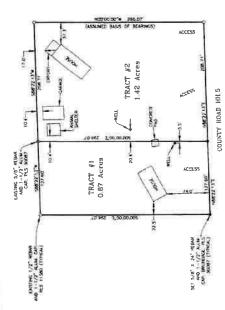

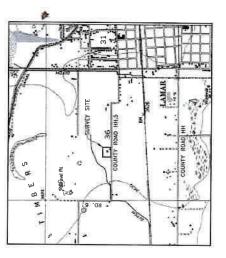

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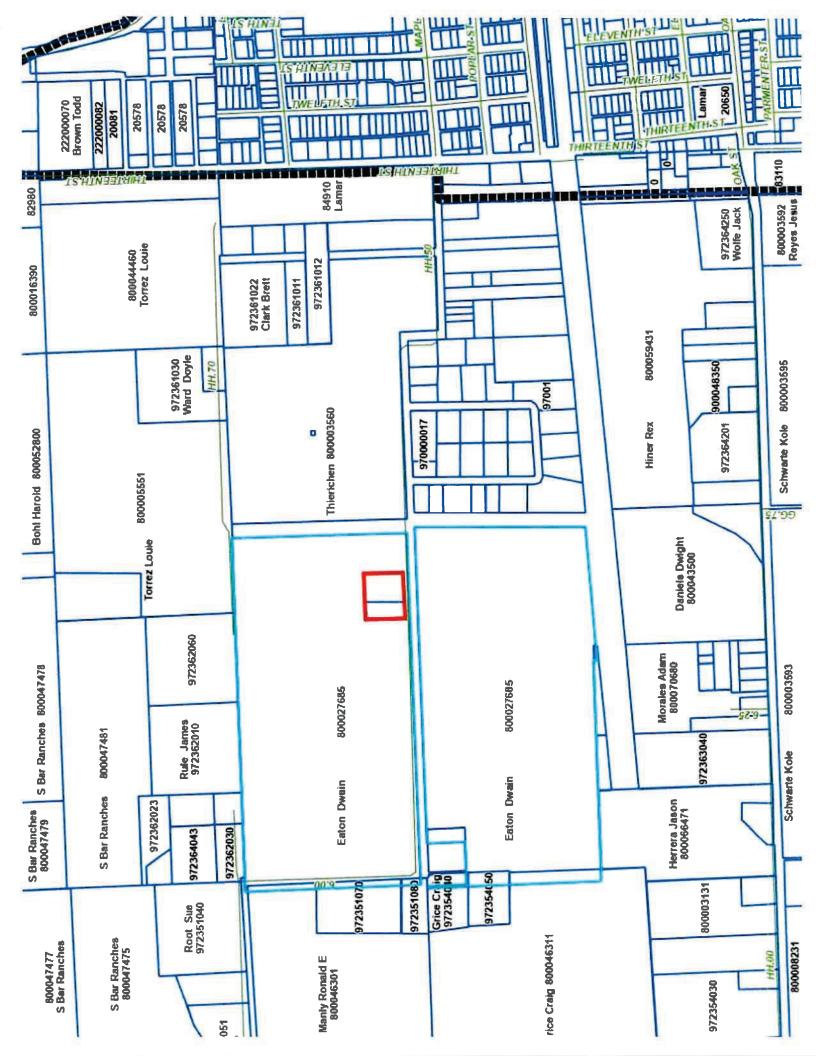
